



What a year 2023 has been!

We rejoice in God's providence and His goodness. The recently concluded International Brethren Conference Mission 8 or IBCM8 held in Kuala Lumpur saw a total of more than 1,200 delegates

from 104 countries attending the conference from 19th June to 24th June 2023. 2,760 people viewed the conference live via YouTube. For more updates on the IBCM8 conference, please turn to pages 7 - 17.

This *Diakonia* magazine is an important tool of communication for the Christian Brethren Secretariat of Malaysia ("CBSM"). CBSM via Diakonia acts:

- 1. To encourage and share combined activities so that Assemblies can work and grow together in unity.
- 2. To be a networking centre for the dissemination of timely and useful information for the purpose of prayer and co-operative action.
- 3. To assist in the strengthening of the Assembly witness by sharing articles & news.

The theme for this year's Diakonia is "Love Thy Neighbour". This theme is taken from the bible verses of Mark 12:30-31 "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: 'Love your neighbour as yourself', there is no commandment greater than these." "Loving your neighbour as yourself" is found eight times in the Bible. Loving your neighbour as yourself is so important to God that He not only repeats Himself, but He also makes it a command. And not just one in a list of many commands. Jesus coupled the command to love your neighbour as yourself with loving God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength. Apostle James calls it the royal law. It sounds beautiful, and it is when we obey it.

But loving your neighbour as yourself isn't always easy. That's why God made it a command. He knew we'd struggle. Making it a commandment is actually to our benefit. How so? By prompting us to approach it deliberately, to do it on purpose, to be intentional about it, even at times driven by our own needs. This is what it means to love your neighbour as yourself.

There are ten (10) main points for us to consider in what "Loving your neighbour" means:

- Acting with compassion.
- Looking out for their wellbeing.
- · Serving them.
- Speaking kindly.
- Making allowances for other people's humanity.
- Sharing in their joys and sorrows.
- Forgiving.

Let us remind ourselves that Diakonia is not just a communication instrument for our Assemblies but to some extent, it's a reflection of our health and vitality. With God's help, let's persevere to ensure that Diakonia continues to be the servant that it is meant to be.

From CBSM General Secretary's Desk



CBSM continues to work towards serving the assemblies better. Our goal is to enable and encourage brethren to work together in unity by facilitating communication and cooperation. This is often challenging since we all have our differences, but we have the same Lord,

same Mission, and the same Gospel. We are grateful to the assemblies who have prayed and contributed to the running of CBSM. We shall endeavour to serve the assemblies more effectively. This year will be the election of trustees for the next term of 2024 - 2025. Pray for the Lord's will to be done in selection of the trustees.

Assembly Leadership Conference (ALC)

ALC was held at the Port Dickson Methodist Centre, $7^{th}-10^{th}$ Sept 2022, a year later than the usual biennial schedule due to the pandemic. The election of the

trustees, normally held at the ALC every two years, was held over Zoom in 2021. There will not be an ALC this year in 2023 but the election of trustees for the new term will be held over Zoom.

The theme for ALC 2022 was "Together", where the Chinese-speaking and English-speaking assemblies came together for the first time in an ALC. The idea was not just the working together between the English and Chinese assemblies, but that all assemblies will work together in unity. We thank the Lord for our plenary speakers, Dr. Tan Chong Tin (Jalan Tiga Gospel Hall) and Dr. Daniel Wong (Melaka Gospel Centre) who ably challenged the delegates to continue the vision and mission of the early missionaries by using contemporary methods but yet staying true to the message of the gospel. All the plenary sessions and almost all workshops were interpreted both in English and Mandarin.

Altogether there were 113 delegates (including part-timers), 63 from the English-speaking and 50 from Chinese-speaking. Although the majority were over 55 years of age, we are encouraged by the sizable number of 40–55-year-olds, as well as a number under 40-year-olds. Apart from the 4 plenary messages, there were a total of 6 workshops and 4 separate parallel sessions for the English and Chinese speaking assemblies. A very key session was the discussion/introduction of the Workers' Trust Fund. There is a more detailed article on this in this issue of Diakonia. There were also sessions on Youth and IBCM Network. There were 10 book and poster displays, many with free materials and free books. We are happy to report that the free books were all taken up.

We wish to thank the committee that led the organising of the ALC, the speakers, workshop leaders, and the many who stepped up during the ALC to help ensure a smooth conference. Most of all, we thank and praise the Lord for enabling and guiding the conference. Do continue to pray that actions will be taken by the various assemblies that were represented to continue the mission with the methods shared and seek ways to cooperate in unity.

Government Recognition of CBSM

CBSM continues in its attempt to seek the recognition of the government so that CBSM may represent the assemblies in their affairs. This is only a representative "face" to the government and is in no way meant to control or determine how each individual assembly is governed. Each assembly is still answerable to the Lord, not CBSM. This would be similar to NECF, which does not determine the practices of their members. Some recognition by the government can be helpful in several circumstances. For example, if a state government is allocating land for Christian churches, CBSM can represent the assemblies instead of the local assembly in the area, which may not have the resources or number of believers to justify the need for the land. Or if the government seeks to tax an assembly for income, "members" of CBSM can rightly justify that they are a church, especially where some of the assemblies have names that do not sound like traditional churches.

CBSM had prepared a package of documents highlighting the presence and good work of the assemblies in Malaysia since the arrival of the "Brethren" assemblies in 1855, being the 2nd "Protestant denomination" to arrive in Malaya (after the Anglicans). We have copies of marriage certificates dating back to 1890, solemnised at Mission Chapel, Farquhar Street, Penang by William MacDonald. Thanks to Burmah Road Gospel Hall for keeping such records.

After much arrangement and follow up, CBSM had been granted a meeting with the Senior Private Secretary to the Minister of Unity. Three CBSM representatives met up with the Secretary on 17th April 2023. It was a very cordial and positive meeting. The Secretary understood our request as we highlighted key pages of our package of documents. He committed himself to reviewing the package, discussing it with his directors and then with the Minister. We have yet to receive updates, but we will be following up. Pray with us that CBSM would be granted recognition so that we may better represent and serve the assemblies.

IBCM8

In preparation for IBCM8 Conference, IBCM* Network had contacted CBSM concerning their holding the Conference in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. CBSM, representing the host country, will be an integral part of the conference and we are proud to be a key player in this international conference. In this Diakonia issue, there will be an article

about the conference. CBSM's role in the conference was to be the main contact/communicator for Malaysian delegates and vendors. Since most of the expenses would be in Ringgit (RM), CBSM will be the channel in which to dispense payments on behalf of IBCM Network who would transfer the necessary funds to CBSM. We are thankful to Albert Ng, CBSM Administrator, for carrying out all the transactions with diligence and so much care, even following up on the loose ends, way after the conference to this day.

Nepal Missions Project

CBSM had been overseeing the Nepal Missions Project when the commending assemblies were not able to due to their limited resources. CBSM is not chartered to be a missions organisation. We held the task temporarily until an assembly or assemblies could take on the leadership. We are pleased that Bandar Sunway Gospel Centre and Melawati Gospel Centre have joined hands to oversee the mission work. The 2 assemblies have been actively involved in the Nepal Missions before taking on the role. They welcome all assemblies to partner with them in the work of reaching the Nepalese with the gospel.

It's been clearly observed that the assemblies have fewer and fewer youths in attendance. As a result, CBSM has formed a Youth Think Tank to look into ways to meet the needs of the Youth. The IBCM8 even had a special youth rally on the Saturday prior to the conference. Anyone who feels led by the Spirit to be involved in this Think Tank may contact CBSM.

Church Revitalization

Another issue identified by CBSM is the plight of the small assemblies in small towns. Many have buildings and properties but few in believers. CBSM is looking into how the assemblies can work together to assist these little flocks. We have a small team visiting these assemblies to see how we can help. Pray with us as we seek the Lord's wisdom.

Legacy Fund

CBSM has a fund we've named the Legacy Fund, available for assemblies and agencies who may need some funds to start or renew their mission efforts. This fund has been contributed by a brethren who have gone to be with the Lord. There are some guidelines to ensure that the fund is used well, one of which is that it is limited to RM50,000.

8th International Brethren Conference on Mission (IBCM8)

The Theme: For Christ's Love Compels Us (2 Corinthians 5:14) www.ibcm.net



It was a privilege for IBCM Network to host the global IBCM8 conference in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia from 19 to 24, June 2023. As one family 1208 participants from 104 countries gathered to celebrate, worship, and be inspired for ministry and mission together.

MAIN SESSIONS

The conference gathered under the theme "For Christ's Love Compels Us" and encouraged us with daily ministry focusing on Unity, Mission, Discipleship, Care, and Worship. The keynote speakers, Ramez Atallah and Nate Bramsen, with one voice brought strategic and visionary addresses, encouraging us to believe that anything is possible with God, that God wants to redeem, reconcile, and transform this broken world with his love, bringing beauty from ashes. They called us to have the heart of God that gives everything for each other and to reconcile the world to Christ. Nate and Ramez both remarked that at this conference the unity and love were tangible. Praise God for that.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Ramez Atallah - Egypt; Leadership & Mission


Ramez was born in Cairo, Egypt and emigrated with his family to Canada when he was sixteen. He came to know the Lord through Rosemount Bible Chapel in Montreal and was discipled as a student through the Inter-Varsity group at McGill University. From 1972 to 1980, he developed and directed the ministry of the Groupes Bibliques Universitaires du Quebec. In 1980 along with his wife Rebecca (an MK from

Haiti) and two small children, he returned to Egypt, where he became the IFES Regional Secretary for the Middle East.

He attended the first Lausanne Congress for World Evangelization in 1974 and was subsequently appointed as the youth representative on the Lausanne Committee. He served on the Committee, in different capacities, from 1974 to 1994. In 2006 he rejoined Lausanne as Program Chairman for Lausanne III 2010 Cape Town Congress.

From 1990 – 2021 he was the CEO of the Bible Society of Egypt. During that time the Society developed from a small organisation to become the largest Arabic Bible publisher in the world serving more than 2,000 Churches of all denominations across Egypt and most Arabic speaking Churches worldwide. The Society now has 8 branch offices in Egypt, 18 Bookshops and 220 staff.

He retired from that position in 2021 and now continues with the Bible Society as their Senior Advisor.



Nate Bramsen - USA; Youth & Mission

Nate Bramsen was born in Senegal and has spent the majority of his life on the African Continent. After graduating with a business degree from North Greenville University and a Masters from Kansas State University, Nate headed overseas to ensure that those who have never heard of Jesus, hear the Gospel. While working with street children in the Middle East, he founded ROCK International, an organisation to reach children trapped in situations of crisis. He and his wife

Priyanka are now involved in itinerant and media ministry which includes a podcast called INTO YOUR BIBLE (available on YouTube, Apple Podcasts, Spotify, etc).

He is also the author of the books, What If Jesus Meant What He Said? and Prosper: Enjoying Intimacy With God (written during a journey with cancer) along with Dive In (a practical book on studying God's Word). For more, check out www.intoyourbible.org Together with his wife Priyanka and their daughters Haven and Sage, they share a passion for this generation to become unconditional followers of Jesus Christ and to see unreached souls accessed with the Gospel. During their free time, they love exploring cities, going on hikes, and trying new foods.

NETWORK TRACKS AND ELECTIVES



For the first time at an IBCM Conference the participants gathered in ministry Network Tracks to connect, discuss, and then envision in their area of service for God. Following the conference each network is encouraged to continue to support, bless, collaborate, and learn from each other, so that these networks grow to strengthen the churches worldwide. Across the conference week there were 45 electives that focused on specific issues connected to each Network Track – Youth, Mission, Leadership, Children, Training & Theology, Church Ministry, and Evangelism & Church Planting.

YOUTH FOCUS

IBCM8 had a specific youth focus. Over the last 4 years the IBCM Network team has intentionally created a Youth Network of over 100 Youth Ambassadors from over 70 countries. Together with these leaders we have shaped the youth components that were present throughout IBCM8, such as the youth panels, the youth network track, and the Go-Serve mission trips.

This strategic focus encouraged over 260 under 35-year-old attendees. Over a meal at the conference the Youth Ambassadors gathered to get to know each other, and to start to envision how regional and global collaboration among the youth could strengthen and transform our churches. Many are now considering the possibility of youth conferences and other events in their regions.

GO-SERVE MISSION TRIPS

IBCM Network in collaboration with the local churches has organised a number of short-term mission trips following the

conference. The Go-Serve mission trips have been designed to allow the local churches in the host country to set the mission agenda while also providing the opportunity for international mission teams to come together to participate in missions in various contexts and countries.



Eight mission teams were hosted by the local churches in Malaysia, Cambodia, and Philippines. Around 55 participants took part in these mission trips, which offered various ministry opportunities enabling all to serve no matter what their gifting. A number of youths commented that they would not have participated in the conference if the mission trip option was not included as a part of the overall experience. We hope that the Go-Serve mission trips will be a feature of future conferences.

REGIONAL CONFERENCES



For the first time a gathering of all the Regional Conference committees was held over a meal at IBCM8. They met to share their experiences and to consider how each regional conference could learn from IBCM8. They were encouraged to consider incorporating the youth and mission focus and also how they can collaborate and learn from each other as they consider their strategic role in their specific regions. All the committees are anticipating a renewed excitement and vision in their regions as they plan toward their respective gatherings in 2025.

IBCM8 Mission Trip Group 1: Cameron Highlands, Pahang

Introduction:

The IBCM 8 Mission Trip team, Cameron Highlands Group 1, consisted of three brothers and three sisters from the United States. The brothers – Luca Drago, Micah Ferguson, Youssef Daoud – and the sisters – Isabella Chance, Lauren Drago, Molly Brown – visited and served in three villages within the Kuala Lipis region.

First Village - Kampung Dusun Pak Senam

The first village visited by Group 1 was Kampung Dusun Pak Senam where they spent 3 days and 2 nights. Here, they had a great time with the children residing in Hostel Rimba, a hostel built to specifically cater to children from the Batek tribe. The team organised engaging games and storytelling sessions for the kids. In addition, they conducted a praise and worship session with the villagers and Sister Isabella shared her testimony.

Second Village - Kampung Gelawin

The second village, Kampung Gelawin, is a unique community where members from the Batek tribe reside. The team spent 2 days and 1 night here. This village is known for its mobile nature as the tribe moves approximately every 4 to 6 months. Despite the transient lifestyle, the team embraced the opportunity to connect with the people and share the love of Christ with them.

After they had shared the Gospel, the ladies were given the incredible opportunity to name the child. They decided to name him Daud – after the Bible story they had shared with the children.

The third village visited was Kampung Tual, a beautiful community comprising 500 families from the Semai tribe. Situated deep within the interior, reaching the village required a journey of 1 hour and 30 minutes. The team spent 3 days and 2 nights here and actively engaged with the children, organising various activities that brought smiles to their faces.

House visits were also carried out during their stay, allowing the team to understand the daily lives and struggles of the villagers. The brothers had an exciting experience as they went foraging for tapioca, immersing themselves in the local culture and lifestyle.

Gelawin, and Kampung Tual created moments where God's Word was sown in their hearts. The praise and worship sessions and shared personal testimonies will hopefully continue to work in the hearts of the villagers.

Driven by compassion, dedication, and a desire to serve, the participants were able to exemplify the true essence of Christ's love. The trip demonstrated the power of unity and the positive impact that a dedicated group of individuals, guided by the love of Christ, can make in the lives of others.

Mission Trip to Gua Sukat, Sarawak - OOO-HAA

"Ooo-haa!" is traditionally an Iban call for the community to convene or celebrate. For a former chief minister of Sarawak, the call means "I love Sarawak". Compelled by the love of Christ, a team of 6 IBCM8 delegates from the USA responded to the call to serve the people of Sarawak by participating in a Short-Term Mission (STM) to Gua Sukat, Sarawak, Malaysia. Gua Sukat is a small Iban community of about 30 families in the district of Sri Aman, about 2.5 hours drive north-eastward from Kuching, the capital city of Sarawak.

Sarawak is now the only state in Malaysia where Christians outnumber Muslims. Out of the 2.45 million people in Sarawak, 1.2 million (50.1%) are Christians; or 41.8% of the Church in Malaysia. (Source: Population and Housing Census, 2020). Indigenous Christians form the backbone of the Body of Christ in Malaysia but yet they lack solid Bible teachings and resources in the Bahasa Malaysia/native language to build the faith of children, youth and pastoral leadership.

For hundreds of years, the ancestors of the Iban practised animistic beliefs. Although the majority of Ibans are now Christians, many continue to observe their traditional ceremonies. The team had the opportunity to witness a Gawai (harvest festival) closing ceremony during our stay in Gua Sukat.

The STM's primary objective was to encourage a young assembly, Gua Sukat Gospel Hall, known to locals as GIGS. The church in Gua Sukat was founded by the Anglicans, but like many churches in the interiors of Sarawak, the church was abandoned for many years, without a trained Bible teacher. Pastor Amin Ambau responded to a call to return to his village in 2017 to serve his fellow Ibans. Prior to his return, Pastor Amin served as a full-time worker among the Orang Asli in Pahang under PanOAM.

Since June 2020, GIGS is supported by 4 churches in the Klang Valley - Bangsar Gospel Centre, Kelana Jaya Gospel Centre, Petaling Jaya Gospel Hall and SS Gospel Centre.

The 6 IBCM8 delegates were accompanied by 11 believers from these 4 assemblies. Nationality, race and age did not hinder us from serving together. Esther recalled that, "It was such a blessing to have such an integrated team of Malaysians and Americans serving together. I loved the unity I experienced on the team, especially since there was a big age gap from 18 years old all the way to 70+. The team dynamics was probably my favourite because everyone had a role and you could see how God worked through each person". The team stayed in longhouses hosted by 3 Iban families throughout our 9 days in Gua Sukat. Esther added that, "This enabled us to experience the lifestyle of our host family and see the life she lives and hear stories about her life".

During the STM, the team was involved in 3 main programs i.e., Vacation Bible School (VBS) type teaching sessions among children (22 children attended); a Youth Camp (44 youths); and a seminar on "A Blessed Family" for adults (more than 30 adults). We also cherished many informal interactions with the villagers. See Ai, the oldest

team member, shared, "The Lord gave me the burden to minister to the ladies by doing devotions with them. Showing them how to listen to God's voice, confessing their sins, and listening to instructions about what God wants them to do". Foo, who was not well during the trip and isolated from the main group, said, "I remained far away from the main activities, but my Lord sent some local 'non-practising Christians' to speak to me about their lack of understanding of the Scriptures. There was a silver lining to my isolation, the fringe members of this community had received an avenue to interact with our mission team and we received an opportunity to build up fellowship."

Shane, the USA team leader, reflected, "We had the blessing of getting to go to Sarawak to meet the people there along with experiencing their culture. It was an amazing trip that really pushed us out of our comfort zones more than we were anticipating. The trip was a reflection of how many people think they know Jesus, but don't; the lack of Bible training; and that God WILL use you if you step out in faithfulness and GO!

Steve echoed, "This mission in Sarawak has reinforced my conviction that the Great Commission is urgent, and a life on mission is for everyone. Sarawak has touched my heart, and I am immensely grateful for the opportunity to serve, speak, and spark a fire for the Kingdom of God in this beautiful community." We have lived, learned and come to love this community in Sarawak and we long to see them grow in their faith and be strengthened in our Lord Jesus Christ.

Mission Trip to Cambodia – Kampong Chnnang

This is the first time IBCM has organised a Go-Serve outreach mission, and seven delegates from IBCM8 signed up for the trip to Kampong Chnnang in Cambodia from June 24 to 30, 2023. They were Leslie (Australia), Avenelle (St Kitts & Nevis), Leah (Trinidad & Tobago), Lona (Australia), Marco and Danielle (from Italy), and Mei Lin

(Malaysia). Dani was appointed the team leader and IBCM connected us to Brother Kian Tan whose ministry in the province of Kg Chnnang was featured in Diakonia 2022.

The mission agenda was set by the local church to provide the opportunity for the international mission team to use their gifts to serve in a foreign context. Kian and his wife Akiko have been serving in the Sangkhim church and one of their ministries is the school which they had helped to set up, i.e. Sangkhim Canaan School (SCS).

The main task assigned to this team was to teach the Christian Education (CE) classes at SCS. It proved to be a very enriching

and inspiring experience. Prior to the trip, the team had met on Zoom several times to plan some lessons according to the time schedule provided by Kian. CE classes are conducted in Khmer language and taught by the local Christian teachers as part of their workload. Every class, from Primary One (Age 7) to Grade 12 (Age 18) has CE at least once a week. We were told that we could present a bible lesson and gospel message, give testimonies, teach songs, use drama/role play, do crafts and/or play games. In our Zoom discussions, we made a rough plan and fine-tuned it as we went along. We felt very encouraged by the eager response from all the students in the classes. The interpreters worked well alongside us and we observed that most of the students understood what we communicated and actively took part in the programme.

Basically, we focused our teaching on certain themes such as God's Love, Sacrifice, Friendship, Peace, and Good News. Team members were able to use their gifts in teaching, storytelling, singing, acting and coordinating to maximise the use of 40-50 minutes of each class. For the younger ones, we shared Bible stories and used puppets or mime to make the lessons lively. We also got them to

memorise a verse in Khmer language, dramatising the verse. For the older ones, we discussed issues of friendship and peace and shared testimonies. Throughout the days, in every class we taught a song which resonates with our message of hope: that Jesus is strong and kind, and if you are lost, you can come to Him.















For 4 full days, we taught a total of 16 classes with an average of 25 students per class (about 400++). The school day begins at 7:00 am with assembly and class at 7:10. There is a long lunch break from 12 - 2pm and most of the students go Classes home resume at 2 and on some days end at 5pm.

We too had our lunch and rest

break for two hours, but during the times when we did not have a CE class, the ladies

offered crafts for the younger ones, while the brothers played football and volleyball with the teens. Language may have been a barrier but with activities such as these, not much language was needed. There were many opportunities to break the shyness barriers.

On the whole, the team worked very well as ONE, reflecting truly that the Body of Christ, consisting of many parts (especially as we are from different nations and cultural backgrounds), could come together as a united front. We believe God gave us this opportunity not just to serve, but to learn from our brothers and sisters (Kian, Akiko, Annie and local Cambodian brothers & sisters) how they have given themselves to serve in such a challenging context. The school is a vast harvest field, with many students whose parents are also not believers but willing to send them here knowing it is a Christian run establishment.

We are also amazed at the work that is being done in Sangkhim Church and the future plans for a Bible school. What we read in the Diakonia 2022 report are no longer just printed words, we now have seen for ourselves what the Sangkhim community is. We thank the whole staff

team for their warm hospitality, generous sharing of their time and energy and most of all, love for fellow brethren, who knew so little about Cambodia and left after a week, with much knowledge and rich experiences. We urge you to pray with and for them and we would highly encourage anyone who wishes to serve (short or long term in missions) to consider Sangkhim as your destination.

IBCM8 Mission Trip Group 2: Cameron Highlands, Pahang

Two teams of internationals (from Australia, South America, North America, and the Caribbean) went to Cameron Highlands after the IBCM8 conference. Esther Tan and Reuben Raju were the team leaders, and I was privileged to join Esther Tan's group. One experience impressed me deeply – a day camp for tweens and early teens. We had Indian and Chinese students as participants mixing with team members from the USA, Costa Rica, Australia, and Antigua. Even among those from the USA, there are different ethnicities such as Indian and Venezuelan. The sight of people of such mixed ethnicities doing things together to build one another up points to how the world may have peace and harmony, with our relationship in the Lord being the unifying factor.

In fact, this was exactly the impression on the brother from Costa Rica, who said:

"For me this mission was very important, because it allowed me to share with brothers and sisters from different countries with the same desire to serve the Lord outside of our countries. It helped me to see that although we are different in culture and customs, we must love each other. There is a great need for the world to know Christ and the Lord is working around the world in many ways, and we can be part of a great work if we humble ourselves in prayer and say, "here I am, send me.""

The brother from the Caribbean added:

"Even though most of us had never met each other before, we quickly became a family and felt as though we had known each other for years. From having devotions, to having breakfast, to speaking with strangers about Jesus, to sharing stories and testimonies of our lives, we truly became a family."

Long before IBCM8, the team leaders had organised online meetings to connect all the participants and to brief them about preparing for the mission trips. During the mission trips it became evident that "God in his divine providence put together a team where the members complemented each other beautifully," as one member noted. Team leader Esther said, "I've witnessed how God has miraculously in His time, placed each of our members to be part of this mission team and how all of us have exercised our own gifts and worked together harmoniously for His ministries." One example of this was



a brother whose main language was Spanish. It so happened that another teammate from another country was fluent in both English and Spanish, and so she was able to translate and interpret for him.

The mission team experience helped participants learn things about themselves too:

- "I saw the need for people to know better who Jesus is and his attributes, which challenges me to know more about Jesus to be able to share in a better way to others."
- "I was able to see first-hand how the Lord can use any willing vessel. I must admit that I felt like Moses at the burning bush before I came on the mission trip. I had no idea how the Lord could use me, and I probably felt a little inadequate coming in ... For me personally, the entire trip has taught me more about God and myself, and I have left with a deeper desire to know God and to let my light shine in my home, my community, my church, and my workplace."

Team leader Esther said, "As a project manager by trade, all of these initiatives would not be possible if God in His Almighty power does not have a hand in all of this and I have witnessed how He has orchestrated all events in unison and in reflection of His glory ... And through it all, the experience, the learnings, the friendships that we have fostered and strengthened, in which I will forever treasure this experience, I just can't stop giving Him praise and glory for the rest of the days of my life."

Though the team members have left for home and other ministries at the conclusion of the mission trips, they still keep in touch via WhatsApp. Perhaps God has not intended for this experience to be the end but the beginning of better and greater things to come for everyone.

Six-Day Mission Trip to Melaka

After being able to attend IBCM for a week, we were allowed to travel to Melaka for six days. On June 24, after breakfast, we made our way to the bus station in Kuala Lumpur to start the approximately two-hour bus ride to Melaka. When we arrived there around noon, we went directly to a local restaurant, where we could try really Malaysian food for the first time. After that we went to our apartment and then we started our first outreach in the community.

Divided into two groups, we were allowed to organise the children's and teenagers' program on a Saturday afternoon. Afterwards, we went to the Wong's family residence for a combined Melaka school Christian Fellowship meeting, where we spent the evening with about 30 teens in the garden.

As a German group we sang a German song - "10,000 Reasons", and two from our group shared their testimonies. We enjoyed the fellowship with the teens very much, and were able to get to know them, their culture, and their everyday life in Malaysia better.



The next day, we were able to spend the morning in the Sunday service at the Melaka Gospel Chapel. Afterwards, we met the brothers and sisters of the congregation for a church brunch, which was something very special for us. In the late evening, we went to a badminton game with young adults from different churches and some non-Christians. In extremely warm indoor temperatures, no t-shirts stayed dry. But it was incredibly fun!

Afterwards, we spent the evening eating, playing board and card games - and it was off to the well-known Jonker Walk, a special experience in Melaka. After just a day and a half, we



noticed how hospitable, humble, and open our hosts were. They took an incredible amount of time to introduce us to their community, their lives, their projects, and their culture. So often when we were driven from one place to the next, we were asked countless questions.

The next day, on Monday, we had the opportunity to get to know En-Fu Care Centre, a home for the elderly located in the neighbouring district of Jasin. We got to know the residents and staff and we were allowed to sing a German hymn, shared the Word of God and gave small gifts. We learned about the history of the home and were moved to learn that the German brethren, George Müller, is their model of faith. As a farewell gift, we all received a cuddly toy of a bear praying to remind us back in Germany to pray for En-Fu Care Centre, its residents, and the staff. In the afternoon, we visited the indigenous children's Shalom Hostel. It was especially touching that the children had prepared a program for us. We were also allowed to share God's Word and play a game together. After visiting the hostel, we went back to our accommodation. Shortly after that, the church "Cultural Night" started, which again took place in the garden of the Wong family's home. There, we had the opportunity to fellowship with many different brothers and sisters, enjoyed good food and shared our German culture through songs, a dance, clothes, a skit, and a report.

On Tuesday we had the privilege of going to Kg. Putat, situated in Pos Iskandar, Pahang. It was a 2-hour plus journey to the village passing through palm oil plantations and the rural part of Malaysia. We were able to meet the adopted indigenous people and their homes. It was a special highlight to enjoy fellowship with them and learn about their circumstances, singing together and to share God's Word.



On Wednesday, we went to Emmanuel Lifespring Home where we again had the opportunity to meet elderly people, sing, pray together and share the gospel message. A highlight for us was the religious and Christian walking tour through the center of Melaka City in the late afternoon. We

learned a lot about the history of Melaka, visited several special places and had time to shop for souvenirs. Afterwards, in the late evening, we went to Amy's Nyonya Heritage Restaurant for a Nyonya dinner with some of the brothers and sisters who accompanied us during the week, and the team enjoyed warm fellowship and a good conversation.

On Thursday, we were able to meet some brothers and sisters again, especially the retired members at "Thursday at Ten" fellowship in the church and celebrated such a beautiful conclusion to our Melaka Mission Discovery program. It was very impressive for us to see what it means to be one body in Christ - beyond Germany, beyond Europe, to get to know brothers and sisters and their challenges in their life as a Christian, to share with each other and to pray for each other. We are extremely grateful for this week in Melaka, which changed us; our perspectives and our horizon. What remains are the memories and the bond in Christ - until we meet again one day. Many, many thanks!

I was curious as to why a seemingly fit and healthy lady like her was living in an old folk home. She told me that she's a widow who didn't get married until her fifties. She got to spend a lot of time abroad in America and in other Asian countries, but now it was time to look for a place to grow old. Ideally a place that would be big enough to accommodate her three best friends as well. "But unfortunately," she said, "my friends didn't experience what God made me experience in preparation."

"When I was in Cambodia a couple of years ago, there were a lot of bed bugs in my hotel bed. That humbled me to be okay with other life circumstances than what I was used to. Now to me this place is great, I'm so thankful and just love my little corner and the opportunity to play the keyboard."

What really moved me about her story is that she didn't lose hope and has a joyful spirit, despite having lost her husband and not being able to be around her friends. She expressed deep gratitude for her situation towards God. I'm thankful to have met her.

Ministry in Indonesia

We are Andrew and Christine Kim with three girls, Erin (17), Annie (14), and Hannah (11) serving in Indonesia since January 2014. We are originally from South Korea, born and raised in godly, Christian families, and went to Canada for missionary training in Ethnos Canada (former New Tribes Mission). The Lord sincerely has led our family to reach out to the unreached both in remote areas, in cities and towns close to where we live in North Sulawesi in Indonesia.

We have been serving in the national training centre to teach the young generation from many different tribes. There are two years of bible school and two years of missionary training in our training centre, and Andrew is teaching various classes such as New Testament outlines, Old Testament outlines, several books of the Bible, Mature Church Model, Biblical family, Biblical Marriage, Church History, Computer courses, etc., and Christine is teaching medical issues to help new students to maintain their health during training and help people in community. We also put many hours in disciplining our students to grow and mature in the Word of God, and to be ready to preach the Gospel and serve the people around them.

While we were serving in the training centre with various ministries, God opened the doors for us to reach out to people in town and we could start a bible study group with them. After we preached the Gospel to young couples, they confessed that they trusted in the Lord as their Saviour, and we started gathering to have breaking of bread and worship God together. We have been training people in the city to preach the Gospel to friends and families, and God brought more folks to listen to the Gospel. It has been a blessing to see this small group of believers grow in faith and the Word of God speaking to them! As they studied the Bible, we could see that they

were eager to serve the Lord, and the Lord gave us a vision to reach out to younger children in the Christian school ministry.

As these young brothers and sisters like to serve people and the Lord, we guided them to form an organisation to start a Christian school, and the Lord opened the door for us! It was a miracle from our Almighty God! As you know, the public school system in Indonesia originated from the M philosophy with a M curriculum and M teachers. We could notice that there is a desperate need to have a Christian school ministry that brings a biblical worldview to children and young people, school workers, parents and families in the community.

Our brothers and sisters are opening an English speaking, Christian childcare centre this September. They have helped to find a building for rent, met the owner to make a contract, and started renovating the building. We plan to finish renovating the building in August while we are hiring teachers, a nanny, and a security guard. As part of the coaching to open the childcare, we are helping to organise weekly leadership meetings, monthly team meetings, plan childcare time schedule, conduct teachers' seminar for Gospel teaching and equip them with teaching skills before September.

We appreciate your sincere prayer and support especially for this New Testament church ministry and Christian school ministry to bring Gospel to the locals and a Biblical perspective to the next generation. We pray that the young generation will grow up with the Word of God and take responsibility to bring the Gospel all over Indonesia in the future.

Last year in 2022, Andrew was diagnosed with thyroid cancer and had an operation in July. He had papillary cancer and modular cancer, and doctors are still figuring it out with various tests as his calcitonin level is still very high, which shows that he might have cancer spreading somewhere in his body. We are waiting for another biopsy test, neck ultrasound, and abdomen CT scan in two weeks

Right: Poverty to happiness: How India was rated by various global indices in 2022.


India ranked 107th out of 121 countries in the Global Hunger Index (GHI) 2022, down from the 101st position the previous year.

It was an intense debate about a serious doctrinal issue. On one side: the Pharisees who believed and argued that Gentile believers should be circumcised, and they should keep the law of Moses." On the other, Paul and Barnabas recounted the signs and wonders God had done through them among the Gentiles.

After an intense discussion, Apostles and Elders settled the matter by concluding "We believe that we are saved through the

grace of the Lord Jesus, in the same way as they also are ". Along with that they suggested a few practical steps the Gentile believers should follow. It was written and circulated among the Gentile churches.

They also recognized that God has entrusted the ministry of the Gospel to the Jews to Peter and ministry of the Gospel to the Gentiles to Paul. And Paul wrote in Gal 2:14 "they only asked us to remember the poor, which I was eager to do". Why were the Apostles asking Paul to remember the poor? The Apostles had known the heart of God and of Jesus for the poor. The poor means those who are poor physically. Often when we read of the poor in the Bible we think only of spiritual poverty, but actually it refers to physical poverty too.



Viv Grigg who worked among the poor people in the slums of different parts of the world says that there are 245 references to 'the poor', 'poverty', or 'lack' in the English scriptures. All these words had six main root words:

Ebyon - needy and dependent (61 times)

Da - the frail poor, the weak (57 times)

Rush - the impoverished through dispossession (31 times) **Chaser** - to suffer lack of bread and water, to hunger (36 times)

Ani - poverty caused by affliction and oppression (80 times).

Viv Grigg further explains the background to understand it better.

"The word Jesus uses in the New Testament for 'poor', ptochos, is the translation of the word anaw, which in turn is derived from ani. Anaw at times means 'the humble, but elsewhere, as in Isaiah 61:1 from which Jesus quotes, it has the meaning of 'the oppressed poor'.

The concept of poverty and the analysis of its causes and effects change as the history of God's dealing with his people progresses. Before the monarchy of David and Solomon, in the Pentateuch and in Job, societies were built essentially around extended family or clan structures. Riches was the blessing of God; poverty was brought about by some misfortune or through judgment of personal sin. The poor man was to be helped from his poverty.

From the time of the monarchy, a centre of privileged people began to develop. Excavations in Tirzeh indicate that before the monarchy, all houses had similar dimensions and furnishings. During the 8th century BC, however, different districts had evolved into and been identified as well-to-do neighbourhood for the rich or slums for the poor.

The rich began to treat the poor as though they belonged to a lower order. Poverty came to be seen as a much deeper deficiency in a person, particularly in the Wisdom literature (the Book of Proverbs and so on).

The poor, for their part, began to see their poverty as synonymous with being oppressed. The standard expression, 'who oppress the poor', attributes the cause of poverty to the rich.

Hence, we find the prophets constantly denouncing the rich (called the oppressor or the unrighteous) and upholding the 'godly poor'.

These are the *ani*, the oppressed poor with whom Jesus identified - 'the poor of Yahweh'. 'Poor in spirit' is an expression primarily describing this social class and its response to such oppression." That's why the commission of the expectant Messiah was "to preach the good news to the poor".

Even before the time of Jesus, we see God made special provisions for those who are poor which showed the heart of God for the poor.

The rich shall not give more, and the poor shall not give less, than the half shekel, when you give the Lord's offering to make atonement for your lives. Exod 30:15

And if someone is too poor to pay the valuation, then he shall be made to stand before the priest, and the priest shall value him; the priest shall value him according to what the vower can afford. Lev. 27:8

Offerings for the atonement were same for both the rich and poor signifying that both are equal before God. Even the sacrifices that were affordable were prescribed for the poor. God always made many provisions for the sustenance and care of the poor in the law.

"And when you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap your field right up to its edge, nor shall you gather the gleanings after your harvest. You shall leave them for the poor and for the sojourner: I am the Lord your God." Lev. 23:22

"If your brother becomes poor and sells part of his property, then his nearest redeemer shall come and redeem what his brother has sold. Lev 25:25

"If your brother becomes poor and cannot maintain himself with you, you shall support him as though he were a stranger and a sojourner, and he shall live with you. Lev. 25:35

"If your brother becomes poor beside you and sells himself to you, you shall not make him serve as a slave" Lev. 25:39

"If a stranger or sojourner with you becomes rich, and your brother beside him becomes poor and sells himself to the stranger or sojourner with you or to a member of the stranger's clan" Lev. 25:47

"If among you, one of your brothers should become poor, in any of your towns within your land that the Lord your God is giving you, you shall not harden your heart or shut your hand against your poor brother" Deut. 15:7

It is interesting that God wanted the poor to be treated with dignity. So God didn't ask the Israelites that they harvest all and donate some part of it to the poor. But leave it there so that the poor can come and harvest it for themselves. Thus, they had dignity and worked for their own food with their own hands.

The Scripture also reminds us of the blessedness of helping the poor.

Blessed is the one who considers the poor! In the day of trouble, the Lord delivers him; Ps 41:1

Whoever oppresses a poor man insults his Maker, but he who is generous to the needy honours Him. Prov. 14:31

Whoever is generous to the poor lends to the Lord, and He will repay him for his deed. Prov. 19:17

Whoever closes his ear to the cry of the poor will himself call out and not be answered. Prov. 21:13

Whoever gives to the poor will not want, but he who hides his eyes will get many a curse. Prov. 28:27

Prophets always reminded the Israelites the level of their spirituality in connection with how they treated the poor. God said he delights in taking care of the poor rather than rituals of offerings and fasting.

Is it not to share your bread with the hungry and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover him, and not to hide yourself from your own flesh? Isa. 58:7

Jesus and the Poor

"The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to bring good news to the poor; he has sent me to bind up the broken hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound"; Isa 61:1 Bringing good news to the poor was the commission of Jesus.

The Gospels portray the heart of Jesus for the poor. The Gospels portray many examples. Jesus chose to associate with the poor and the sinners and always gave to the poor. "Jesus was telling him, "Buy what we need for the feast," or that he should give something to the poor." John 13:29

Early Church and Poor

The apostles, who learned from Jesus, followed the footsteps of their master in loving and caring for the poor.

The early church exemplified God's heart where the rich and poor worshipped and lived for God's glory. Acts 2:42-47 is one of our favourite passages to describe the characteristics of the New Testament church but often we miss to emphasise the character of the early church in taking care of the poor. Acts 4:34 says that "There was not a needy person among them," Acts 3:46 they received their food with glad and generous hearts. There was no needy among them because they had generous hearts to share with others what they had. What a challenge for our NT churches!

The apostles encouraged the Gentile believers to share their physical blessings with the poor among the saints in Jerusalem. Rom 15:26 - It is in the context of the need to support the poor that Paul said to follow the example of Jesus "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich. 2 Cor 8:9. Though these verses can be thought of as a spiritual implication, Paul gives it as an example for us to practise

it. We are called to follow the example of Jesus of becoming poor by giving away what we have to make others rich. And the Gentile churches followed their master and supported the poor beyond their capacity.

As the years went by, we saw the church started discriminating against the poor even during the time of the Lord's Supper, so Paul had to write to Corinthians ...do you despise the church of God and humiliate those who have nothing? What shall I say to you? Shall I commend you in this? No, I will not. 1 Cor 11: 22

James warned them how they showed partiality to the rich while ignoring the poor. He also questioned the faith of those who didn't care for the poor and needy. "What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? ¹⁵ If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, ¹⁶ and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good² is that? ¹⁷ So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead." James 2:15-17

John also emphasised the need to show our faith in God by loving our brother in action. ¹⁶ By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers. ¹⁷ But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him? ¹⁸ Little children, let us not love in word or talk but in deed and in truth. 1 John 3:17-19

So, the scriptures show us how to deal with the poor as believers. What are some of the things we can do as a church or individual in helping the poor?

Viv Gregg shares that there are three types of poor in the Bible.

- Chaser: Poverty caused by sin. Share the Gospel with them to come out of sin.
- Ebyon and dal: Poverty caused by calamity. Share your resources with them. Help the widows, orphans, old and physically handicapped etc.
- 3) Ani, anaw and rush: Poverty caused by oppression. Empower them to come out of oppression of various kinds economical, social and caste. (Give them education, find them a job or help them to start a business, connect with people etc).

India still has the world's largest number of poor people in a single country.

Of its nearly 1 billion inhabitants, an estimated 260.3 million are below the poverty line. So, can we ignore the poor and needy of our land?

The early missionaries who came to Kerala not only shared the gospel but empowered the people through

education and medical help. So, this generation enjoys all the fruits of their labours yet often forgets that we are blessed to be a blessing.

History is full of stories about how Christians served the poor and needy out of their love toward God. How a small group of Christians conquered the Roman Empire - Church Historian Bruce L Shelley tells "Practical expression of

Christian love was probably among the most powerful causes for Christian success." "Christian love found expression in the care of the poor, of widows and orphans; in visits to brethren in prisons or to those condemned to a living death in mines; and in acts of compassion during famine, earthquake, or war." God wants us to follow His love for all people by remembering the poor and let it be said of our churches that, "There was no needy among them."

Cambodia Church Planting

Gospel Outreach Worldwide (GOWW) (goww2005@gmail.com)

Preliminary Ground Survey - Phnom Penh

In late 1995, Kajang Life Chapel (KLC) heard of the open door in Cambodia. In March of the following year (1996), the Lord showed us the tremendous needs in this country and the possible ways to start some work. We were overwhelmed by the history of the country - the atrocities committed by the Khmer Rouge and the terrible suffering of the people. The people were crying for help - physically, and more so mentally and spiritually. Many have not heard of our Lord Jesus Christ even once! The urgency was so real, we felt that we should speed up and go over as soon as possible. On May 13, we committed ourselves to rent two units of a three-storey building at USD 500/unit/month (the exchange rate then was 1:2.5). 137 A/B, St.109 was our first Centre in Cambodia.

We proceeded almost immediately to apply for NGO status. We saw the Lord's hand in this. The NGO status was obtained under Shalom Life Careserve Centre (SLCC). And, we went through all the obstacles in the last twenty over years renewing it, trusting Him at all times not to submit to any bribery. Praise the Lord, He did it. However, our NGO status could not be renewed last year and we are now in the process of applying for a local NGO.

KLC Model in Church Planting

We tried and started various ministries as the contact points to reach out to the people of Cambodia, training up the believers, and building up the churches throughout these years.

We have been developing and planting churches using the KLC model:

Contact > 2. Pre-evangelism, 3. Prepare the Ground、Follow-up > 4. Gospel_> 5. Nurture> 6. Disciple Making > 7. Leadership Training > 8. Church > 10. Spinning Out

The various contact efforts allowed us to have the opportunities to share the gospel that we had throughout the years including but not limited to English classes, English labs, Chinese classes, Computer classes, English Youth Fellowship, Eagle Motivation Club for university students, Family Outreach Fellowship, etc.

We also organised Evangelistic gospel camps, English camps, and Bible camps throughout the years. A 7-day Evangelistic Camp at Kg. Som in August 1999 with as many as 80 campers was a success. We experienced God's protection through the great flood. It was like Moses and the Israelites crossing the Red Sea.

Short-Term Mission Teams (STM)

In the last twenty-seven years, we had more than 100 short-term mission teams coming to help us. Obviously, the teams also had a suitable environment to learn and be exposed to cross-cultural missions. Scores of churches benefited from coming and working with us.

Training up the Local Leaders

We also spent the effort to build the local believers' spiritual foundation through one-to-one Bible studies, Bible Camps, and a few batches of believers who participated in full-time studies in the Nazarite Training Centre (NTC). We had a total of three batches of NTC graduates and 1 batch of TIP graduates (2000, 2005, 2006, and 2009).



in 2005/2006 during NTC training. The three of them came to PP SLC when they were youths, and now all are married with children and serving in PP SLC faithfully.

We set up Bethany Home in September 2010 with the purpose to maintain and continuously nurture believers from Suong and Takeo to walk closely with God and learn to serve Him when they further their studies in universities in PP. And later on, we extend it to non-believers from the provinces too, for the purpose of bringing the gospel to them.

PP Shalom Life Chapel (SLC)

PP SLC Church Committee was formed on 1st November 1999 with three locals as learners. We celebrated with them their 20th Anniversary on 29 October 2016. They have grown during 2016 in the provisional autonomy year. They became autonomous and fully responsible for the PP SLC starting in January 2017. On 21st May 2017, Mr. and Mrs. Loh Ah Asiau from KLC went over to ordain elders and deacons of SLC PP church.

The local believers and leaders are serving, nurturing, and leading the Church to continue to be His light and salt in PP themselves until today. Pray for them to continue striving to live for the Lord with good testimonies and also be able to share the gospel with the lost souls of their people. We thank the Lord for successfully building a local Khmer church, SLC PP with twenty years of faithful labour by many dedicated servants of the Lord.

Suong

We made an exploratory and preliminary trip to Kg. Cham town in 1997 and it was the time we came to know about Suong town. Beginning in 1998, we sent STM to Kg. Cham town and Suong town each year during the Christmas season to establish friendships and to share the good news whenever there were opportunities.

We began to send missionaries to live in Suong in January 2002. Following the pattern of KLC's Church Planting work: Contact > Friendship > Outreach > Harvest > One-to-one Bible Study > Baptism, the first baptism was held in 2003 in one of the ponds off the main road to Kg. Cham.

The work quickly expanded; we began to enter the Cham villages. We provided community services-helping the school, distributing food and clothing, constructing clean wells and toilets, and providing medical services.

We also started a kindergarten in Suong, and trained a few local sisters to be our teachers or assistants throughout the years. The Rainbow Kindergarten led many children to come to our SLCC Centre and also later we could continue to reach out to them via English classes, sports ministries, music instruments classes, fellowship, etc.

Suong is like any small town in Malaysia where people leave when they complete high school. The Suong team prepared and trained young believers and sent them to PP SLC. We were glad that many fruits were harvested. We are glad that seven of the nineteen NTC students came from Suong Church. They are nurtured and trained.

Unfortunately, after 18 years of labour for the work in Suong, in December 2021, we had no choice but to stop the work in Suong. The main reason was the lack of manpower. We thank the Lord that at least the two local sisters whom we have trained as kindergarten teachers, can start kindergarten at their respective homes and continue to be Christ's followers and witness for Him in Suong until today.

Takeo

In 2008, two Malaysians and a Cambodian started teaching English at a rented shophouse near Takeo's wet market. We started with English classes, and later God provided us with a piece of land and we built our building. With enough space and compound, we opened a

kindergarten to reach out to young children and their parents. Many STM and volunteers from various assemblies in Malaysia went and helped throughout the years.

By God's grace, the ministry is ongoing with one local worker (one recently got married and left to move to PP in May 2023). A Malaysian sister is now in Takeo for a one-year Spot Program. These two teachers have 4 sessions of teaching every day with about 80 students attending the English classes, and several students coming for personal Bible study and Bible Reading.

We are going through the same challenges as the previous mission station (Suong) in Takeo now. It is a matter of concern that most students leave for PP for work and studies, and some have left their faith to marry non-believers. The main challenge is we could not prepare the next batch of missionaries who can serve in the foreign land before the last one left the field and we do not have mature and faithful believers who can serve in the Takeo Church.

Much prayer is needed for future direction for the servants of God in Takeo, and also the future development of the ministries there.

Conclusion

Over the past twenty-seven years, we thanked the Lord for bringing and sending many faithful workers to serve wholeheartedly in the foreign land. Many are single ladies, some stepped into the land of Cambodia once they graduated from university; some gave up high-paying jobs to be servants for the Lord to live and serve in the villages; some were retirees who went to relieve and to support, and many more angels whom God had prepared for our work in Cambodia; not forgetting those local believers who were trained from spiritual babies until they were part of the team to serve together with us in PP, Suong, and Takeo. Without all these faithful servants of the Lord, and without the grace from the Lord, we will not be able to develop the works in Cambodia this far from 1996 until today for 27 years.

God's hand was with us all the time and it was all His doing. The local believers are challenged to rise up, receive the baton, and possess new lands for Christ as the missionaries exited due to different reasons, eg, health issues, further studies, changing service path lines, marriages, family commitment, or retirement.

We believe God is in control and He has His plan for mission and how the gospel can be spread unto the whole world. We uphold the Word of God as the highest authority on all matters of the Church and the Church is and will always be accountable to the Head of the Church, who is Jesus Christ our Lord, the King of all ages. For us, as His servants, let's continue to be mission-minded to play our roles well with the vision and burden. It is not for our personal interests but for our dear and Almighty Lord who gave His life for us. May all glory be to the Lord.

Spirituality is Not Dead in Australia

In recent years the spiritual climate of Australia has been one of growing secularism. This is seen in the rising proportion of Australians identifying with "no religion," growing from 19% in 2006 to 38.9% in 2021.¹ At the same time in 2021, for the first time in a century, a minority (44%) of Australians identified themselves as Christian, ² a drop of 20% since 2006.

In addition to this, during the same period, Australians have grown increasingly disillusioned with the church. The church, which was once considered to be the respectable "centre of society," in recent years has become so marginalised that for many Australians it is an irrelevant, outdated, "outcast" of modern society.

Amid these changes, however, faith and spirituality continue to be key elements of an Australian's identity (69% strongly or somewhat agree).³ Despite not considering themselves as religious, Australians are increasingly describing themselves as spiritual, with more than one in two (56%) believing in God, spirit or life force and one in four having had a mystical or supernatural experience.⁴

Spirituality is Not Dead, but Many Churches are Struggling.

Whilst spirituality is not dead in Australia, many churches are struggling. Although the gradual decline in Church attendance over the past two decades has finally plateaued, the number of "newcomers," that is people with no previous church background, joining churches is dropping. In 2001, 9% of Protestant church attendees were "newcomers" whereas in 2021 this figure dropped to 5.7%.⁵

In addition to this, young adult retention is also dropping. The overall trend that is being observed is that the church population is ageing with only 12% of current church members falling between the ages of 15 to 30 years.⁶

The net result of this is that many once vibrant brethren churches are struggling and there are too frequent reports of assemblies closing, largely due to:

- decreasing connections with the community,
- losing younger generations from the church, and a
- diminishing vision for disciple-making amongst leaders.

The Train of Train of the Train

Spirituality is Not Dead, so Disciple-Making Needs to be Revived.

Despite an increasingly difficult religious climate, brethren churches that focus on helping their members to "grow in passion for Jesus as they go on mission with Him" tend to be growing, alive, and vibrant worship communities.

The way they are doing that is not through focusing much of their time and energy on more educational programs or attractional church services but rather on *intentional disciple-making using a relational life-on-life methodology.* In short, they are modelling their ministry on Jesus' methods.

I killed a snake! A Cambodian Kukri snake.
It's just about 1 foot long but nevertheless,
it's still creepy! Collectively, we have killed
5 snakes in 5 weeks around Bethany House!
3 of them were venomous Malayan Pit Vipers.
I almost stepped on one before our neighbour came to kill it.
Thank God for His protection.

I am learning to identify different creatures that I encounter around the area. I've always been fearful of snakes and find them so repulsive I don't even want to look at them. But, I was absolutely mesmerised by the Golden Tree Snake, also called the Ornate Flying Tree Snake. The green colour and the ornate patterns on its head and body are so beautiful. Of course, I only dared to have a closer look, only after it had been killed. I found out later that the Golden Tree Snake, though mildly venomous, is not dangerous to humans.

Two decades ago, when I was in the deep jungle on my first mission exposure trip, the missionary posed a situation for our consideration. It goes something like this: Why is it that when someone sees a snake in his house, he would have an instant hostile reaction and with a surge of adrenalin mixed with fear, try to get rid of the repulsive creature as fast as possible either by killing it, or shooing it away. One would most likely have the same reaction upon seeing a rat in the house. And yet, we acknowledge that all creatures are made by God, and in the beginning, all creatures were created good and placed under mankind's dominion or governance. What then caused these unfortunate creatures to suffer such hostility from mankind? If

these animals could talk, they would say to us in frustration, "Isn't it all because of **YOUR SIN** that you have brought this curse and misery even upon our lives? Do you think we like to scavenge for food and be feared, hated and killed by people?"

And so, the missionary drove the point home to each of us, that it is **OUR RESPONSIBILITY** to make right this wrong, by speeding the Lord's return through preaching the gospel of the kingdom to all creation, to the ends of the earth, so that the whole creation that has been groaning as in the pain of childbirth and waiting in eager expectation, will also be liberated from its bondage to decay and brought into the glorious freedom of the children of God.

When I gave an update in January, Raksa's blood cancer treatment was going well. But she got unwell again before her next follow-up appointment and blood tests showed her cancer had come back. She had to go for a more intensive treatment with stronger Chemotherapy doses. This intensive treatment plan includes 8 courses of Chemotherapy over a period of one year or more, depending on Raksa's situation. At the time of writing, Raksa is in Bangkok for her second course of chemotherapy. To prepare Raksa for the chemotherapy, the medical team stuck 4 IV needles on her arms, 2 on each arm. This makes Raksa feel nervous. The side effects after the chemotherapy are also harder on Raksa this time around. Please continue to uphold Raksa and her family in prayer. Pray for strength and endurance as Raksa enters her second year of Chemotherapy. Raksa and her family send their grateful thanks for all your prayers and gifts.

We visited Krisna often to encourage her. Boret and

Kunthea have family devotion every night with Krisna. Krisna remains positive but feels bored because she is still bedridden. I brought some materials to show Krisna that she can use her right hand to draw even while lying down. The amputated stump of her left leg is still swollen and painful so she can't turn to rest on her left side. Unfortunately, her medical treatment so far, does not include any physiotherapy. So I just encouraged her to keep stretching and moving every part of her body so that she can still move. Are there any physiotherapists willing to help?

Krisna is in Phnom Penh at the moment and the medical team just performed an operation so that Krisna can straighten a finger on her left hand - the finger next to the one which was amputated. Hopefully, they will treat the swollen left leg too.

Year of the Lord's Favour

One of the most humbling compliments I've received recently is when local friends here say to me, "Thank you for coming back to us and our country." After eight months of being back here, tears still well up whenever I hear that. I can't imagine how disappointed they must've been when many foreigners left, and when no one or organisation can effectively help them end this devastating episode in the history of their country.

While we still don't understand the Lord's purpose and are saddened by the many lives lost, we praise Him for sustaining some of our friends these last two years and for keeping their faith and growing their churches. After being away for a year and a half, my team and I weren't sure what we were coming back to, and how we can continue to serve the people here. But we praise the Lord for using us beyond our imagination in this new season.



You don't hear a lot about the country on the international news these days but the civil war has far from ended. However, we do feel generally safe in our city even though soldiers are roaming the city and sporadic bombings and shootings are still going on. Whereas in other parts of the country especially in the North, there are raids, air strikes and whole villages have to flee.

Christians are not targeted per se but there have been pastors who have been arrested because of their humanitarian work. Christian leaders need prayers to be creative in reaching out to their communities with aid and with the Good News.

Traditionally, the month of December here is called "Sweet December" because that's when churches have more freedom to organise events and outreaches in conjunction with Christmas. After the two-year break due to Covid, last December we were able to help some local churches here to organise outreaches in their communities. Do pray that the seeds sown in the hearts of the people will continue to grow and bear fruit.

One such outreach was at a nunnery that we've regularly visited for a few years. Last Christmas, we very openly

invited them to "taste and see" that our Lord is good. While on one hand, we're thankful that each of them has heard the Good News, we're also saddened because since then, they are not open for us to visit anymore. For now, we're praying for the Lord's intervention to open their hearts to "taste and see" that the Lord is indeed good and for the door to the nunnery to re-open again.

Our hearts really go out to the girls there. Not only them but also the young generation in this nation — whose future and hope have been robbed overnight by the coup. Since then, public schools are not functioning as they should, and we were told that drugs are easily available in schools and the roadside betel nut stalls. Private schools are available but not many can afford the fees, leaving many children at home or forced to work.

We hope to fill in the gap by building this next generation up through education and spiritual transformation. We are working with a network of preschool teachers where we provide training to equip them with teaching skills while challenging them to reach out to the children. We also reopened our language centre this year where we reach out to the young people through teaching English and Korean. The discipleship training centre where we bring people from various parts of the country for training have also just resumed.

We couldn't imagine any of these before we came back and we don't know how long we can be here because the visa requirements and process keep changing. So, we desire to make use of every opportunity given to us to share the hope we can have in Christ and to build up the next generation.

And it is certainly not something that we can do on our own. We covet your prayers for us in this new season with the words of Isaiah in Chapter 61:1-2, "The Spirit of the Sovereign LORD is on (us), because the LORD has anointed (us) to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent (us) to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners, to proclaim the year of the LORD's favour..." That's our prayer for 2023.



Then, what about the Olive Tree Sewing Project? Praise the Lord for providing for the ladies through the Covid-19 pandemic. Recently, two families in Kepong have been called for health screening and interviews by the UN. So, they are preparing to relocate to the US. In my city, more than half of the ladies have found jobs again as preschool teachers and house helpers. A few have moved to another location and the remaining few would like to continue sewing but they can now manage financially without it too.

I am planning to move to a different city in Central next year and am praying that Olive Tree is something the Lord wants me to bring there as well, and if so, how will it look like? Is Olive Tree part of God's plan to proclaim good news to the poor and bind up the brokenhearted? Because when local friends thank me for coming back, I want to say that it's not me, but it was Jesus who sent me. And Jesus has never left them. He will bind up the brokenhearted, proclaim freedom for the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners. His favour rests on the nation.

This article focuses on *loving our neighbours into the Kingdom of God through love and good works.* It is a disciple-making ministry. Our aim is to make disciples and not just converts. Our motivation comes from Christ who has commissioned us to "Go and make disciples of all nations".

Our outreach focuses on the residents in Lengkong Tiga, a housing estate located within 1km of the church premises. This estate comprises 16 Housing Development Blocks (HDB) with 895 households. This is a large harvest field that is within our immediate reach.

We thank God for a dedicated team of kingdom-minded brothers and sisters who regularly serve and engage this community with love. We befriend residents sitting at the void deck (common areas at housing estates) and knock on doors. Initially, we struggle when we encounter resistance. We are also not particularly excited about cold-calls. In fact, we dread it, if not for the urgency to reach the lost for Christ. After all, we are but strangers intruding into the residents' time and privacy. Besides, we are not very fluent in dialects (Hokkien, Cantonese or Teochew). Praise God that He could use our very limited language skills to engage and connect with the residents. God is faithful; He promises to be with us when we go about doing His Kingdom work. We thank God for both open and closed doors. We leap for joy when residents invite us into their homes. We treasure every opportunity to pray and share the gospel with them. Many residents appreciate us for taking the time and effort to listen to their life stories and to show love and concern by praying for them. Most of them are elderly aunties and uncles as the young are at work or in school during the day.



There is an urgency to reach the elderly as they have limited time on earth. Many of them are Taoist or Buddhist who have misconceptions that Christianity is a western religion and therefore not suitable for them. Hence, we try to address this issue as a top priority to put them at ease. Also, many of the elderly are ignorant or have faulty beliefs about the Christian faith. To dispel their misconceptions, we share with them who Jesus is from

the gospels. In this way they can discover for themselves who God is. Faith comes through hearing and hearing by the word of God.

We praise God for the many opportunities to build meaningful relationships with the residents. By His grace we were able to engage many of them on a spiritual level. We sensed that God is actively drawing people to Himself in this community. We thank God for the joy of seeing residents come to faith in Jesus Christ.

Most of them will not feel comfortable stepping into a church as they have been Taoists or Buddhists all their lives. Hence, we need to bring the gospel to them, where they are, where they feel comfortable. Many of them are open to the gospel.

We organised monthly 'makan' sessions and health talks at the void deck and at the Community Centre for the residents. Our primary objective is to provide nutritious meals for the old folks in the community, befriend and actively engage them in songs and activities to help them stay physically, mentally and emotionally healthy. These sessions present vast opportunities for us to build meaningful and spiritual relationships with the residents.



To-date many of them have invited us into their homes where we can share the Gospel or study the Word with them in the safety and comfort of their homes.



We also organised a trip to Jewel Changi for the residents. It was a very memorable and enjoyable trip for the elderly, many of whom were there for the first time. After the outing we brought the residents to our church premises for a short service followed by lunch.



Unfortunately, Covid 19 disrupted many of our activities in the past 2 years. Praise God that with the easing of restrictions, we are now able to resume our disciple-making ministry. To-date we have covered all the 16 blocks in the estate over a period of 6 years. We will continue to disciple the believers there while starting a new work in another neighbouring estate. It is our aim to shed the gospel light and show practical love to the lost.

Why should we offend people with the gospel, that's because Jesus is the only way to God.


Sales of Fully Furnished Sanctuary Home Room for Elderly Folks

Nilai Gospel Chapel (NGC) is a Brethren Assembly that provides opportunities for growth in the love, knowledge, worship & service of Jesus Christ as well as fellowship with believers in a Christ-Centred & Biblically Oriented environment.

NGC (English) had its first inaugural worship on 20 December 1998. Four assemblies, namely Jalan Imbi Chapel (JIC), The Life Chapel (TLC), Bangsar Gospel Centre (BGC) & Seremban Gospel Chapel (SGC) agreed to come together in September 1997 to start the English work in Nilai in view of the potential growth of nearby new industries, colleges & Universities.



There was a serious need for a Christian managed home care for the old people Nilai. in Hence, 2019 a plot of land was offered NGC and was subsequently purchased. The land is situated near Nilai Springs Villas. This is project "NGC named Sanctuary Community

Living". We are writing to present a comprehensive proposal for establishing a fully furnished sanctuary home for elderly folks within our church community. This project aims to create a safe, comfortable, and nurturing environment for our elderly.

As believers, we share a common bond and a calling to care for those in need, particularly elderly believers who have dedicated their lives to the faith. The proposed sanctuary home is a testament to our shared values and a tangible expression of our commitment to providing them with the utmost care, support, and dignity as they enter a new phase of their lives.


Key Salient Points:

1. Purpose

- To build a fully furnished sanctuary home for elderly folks within a Christian community.
- To provide a safe and comfortable living environment for seniors and elderly believers.

2. Project Overview

- About 20 fully furnished rooms with essential amenities, encompassing a total built-up area of approximately 12,000 sq. ft.
- Common facilities area to promote social interaction, including shared spaces for activities and fellowship.

- A dedicated management committee will be established to manage and operate the sanctuary home efficiently, ensuring the well-being of our elderly residents and the maintenance of the facility.
- Investors will be updated on the progress of the project and any developments related to the sanctuary home at agreed intervals. Transparency and communication will be prioritised to keep our investors informed and engaged.

Scope of Target Group and Partnerships

We are pleased to announce that we will offer the first opportunity to both NGC English and Chinese assemblies' members and Business Partners. After a limited period till 31st October 2023, we will open the opportunity to other sister assemblies willing to partner with us until 31st December 2023. After this, we shall open this opportunity to other believers.

This partnership will allow us to create relationships that share the same values, fostering a larger community of support and care for our elderly believers.

Combined Chinese Youth Ministry in North Malaysia

As published in Diakonia 2022, we continued to organise the Youth Camp 2.0 which was held at Petaling Jaya Gospel Hall from 3rd to 5th September 2022. This camp was held to train Christian youth to organise church activities like children camp, Christmas carolling, etc as a preparation for Youth Camp 3.0 and to evangelise to the non-Christian youth.

As such, Youths from Nibong Tebal Gospel Hall, Sungai Bakap Gospel Hall and Bukit Mertajam Gospel Center,

came together to organise a children camp on 17th December 2022 at Nibong Tebal Gospel Hall by themselves with my supervision to fulfil the project set by Youth Camp 2.0.

It was very encouraging to see that the Children Camp achieved two purposes . First, the Youths were trained with the responsibility to get the children to come back physically since the epidemic started, where all children

only go online, and secondly the Youth learnt to organise Church activity independently.

Due to the uncertainty of the school calendar, the Youth camp 3.0 was delayed to 20th until 23rd February 2023. It was held at Malaysia Bible Seminary's camp in Kuang, Rawang.

For the three camps, we saw young souls being saved. Each camp had more than 10 souls being saved. For Youth Camp 3.0, we used Alpha Course as the main sharing tool. It was very interesting as we received favourable feedback.

Since last year, I have organised an online seminar for the Youths from NTGH, SBGH and BMGC with speakers arranged by Yi Sheng focusing on Youth related topics every 3rd Saturday night. It was quite an effort to arrange for them to gather at the beginning, but we managed to do so after the Youth camps.

Starting this year, we started a face to face meet up for Youths every 3rd Saturday night. We also planned to organise a combined physical meet up if there is a fifth Saturday for outdoor games like captain ball etc.



Opened Doors through Science and Technology for the Gospel

In the 2022 issue of the Diakonia, pg. 54, I shared about the opportunities via STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) to present a fresh narrative of the Christian faith in our conversations both within and with those outside the faith. A year down the road, we saw many open doors via this platform.

While the passage in Matthew 28:18-20 is the go-to passage on the Great Commission, we should also consider Roman 10:14,15.


¹⁴ How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher? ¹⁵ And how shall they preach unless they are sent?

The chain of events leading to believe in Romans 10 is **Believe ? Hear ? Preach ? Sent.**

Aligned to this, I introduce the 4 C's:

Connect 2 Contact 2 Converse 2 Convict

Below is the correlation between the chain of Roman 10 and the 4 C's



It is crucial to be able to **contact** and **connect** with those we intend to share the Gospel with. Without these connection points, there can be no **conversations** to point people to Christ. The **conviction** part is not our job but that of the Holy Spirit (John 16:8), but we need to use all means to reach out (contact, connect, converse), to give a reason for the hope that is in us and to be all things to all men so that by all possible means, to save some.

Over the years, we have found that STEM can be effective for contacting, connecting and conversing about our faith. While people might be averse for themselves or their children to come to church, but when it is for STEM activities,



they have less reservations. Furthermore, the children also love to come for STEM programs.

Since starting in 2021, we have conducted programs in 12 assemblies. A similar number in other non-assembly churches and Christian NGOs also engaged us to develop and conduct STEM programs and activities. For working directly with non-Christian groups, we established a commercial entity to avoid problems of working under a Christian banner.



From this year, we have organised our programs into two main streams i.e. the STEM Carnival and the STEM Explorer. The STEM Carnival is designed to accommodate larger crowds through station activities and demos. The STEM Explorer programs are topic or project specific in small group settings.

In Taiping Gospel Hall, we started in February this year with the STEM Carnival. 120 children from ages 6 to 17 turned up. Subsequently, we followed up with the STEM Explorer program there on a monthly basis. We capped the number of participants to 60 for this due to space and resource constraints. On Easter we also did a special program there. Butterworth Gospel Hall carried out their first STEM Carnival in June this year, with about 55 children participating for the English Assembly and 30 for the Chinese Assembly. The English Assembly is now planning to conduct the STEM Explorer program on a monthly basis.



We are expanding our faith narratives around the STEM programs and activities that allows us to transition a conversation that begins with STEM to one concerning faith.

For example, during Easter this year, we did a program called the *Amazing Blood* where we did activities around the science of blood including showing red blood cells under a microscope and drawing blood in front of the children. Taking the conversation from blood to the cross was an easy transition – Why did Jesus die on the cross? He died because he shed his blood. Why did he die? To save us from our sins. We did this program in Cameron Highlands Gospel Hall, Kepala Batas Gospel Centre, Bandar Puchong Gospel Centre, Island Glades Gospel Centre and Taiping Gospel Hall.

Another example of using STEM as part of the conversation for the Gospel involves a gentleman in his late 70's, a regular at our church. He agrees with most parts of the Gospel, except the part about one God and only way back to Him. One day, I said if there are many gods, we cannot do science. One day, water would boil at 100°C and on another day, another god would decide on a different temperature for water to boil. One day the Sun will rise in the East, and on another day, another god might want it to rise in the South. This would make for a very chaotic universe. The (scientific) fact we observe order and regularity in the Universe, indicates a single Hand that sets things in motion and holds everything together. And he agreed!! A couple of weeks later he accepted Christ.

Now that doors have opened, What's next? We are developing a STEM Hub concept where STEM resources and programs are kept. The idea is to allow others to avail themselves of these resources and be trained in how to use them, so they can do the programs. We are also developing contents for a Maker's Space where people can run innovation projects. In this way, we can engage students on a longer-term basis to build relationships.



Currently, we have ongoing work with an assembly-runned school - Sangkhim Canaan School, in Cambodia and a Christian NGO - Lighthouse of Hope in Sarawak, Scripture Union, and Gospel Halls in Taiping and Butterworth. At IBCM8 2023, we found doors opened to complement existing work by groups in Indonesia and

Philippines. The door also seems to be opened for doing STEM outreach in an assembly-runned school in Nigeria. Closer to home, we are looking to work with the Christian Brethren Education Trust Board to utilise the BBBS Education Centre building for a STEM Hub; this to run STEM programs for the community and to service the Klang Valley assemblies with STEM Outreach programs and activities. Lastly, we are looking to partner with private Christian schools.

We used the same strategy i.e., Student Learning & Support or SLS ministry to reach out to the poor students. We started the





INTRODUCTION AND CONTEXT

At the Elders Meeting held during the 2019 Assemblies
Leadership Conference in Ipoh, it was brought to the attention of the elders, the need to assist smaller assemblies in Malaysia.
CBSM was tasked to explore possible ways to assist these assemblies. It was suggested that assembly leaders consider these smaller local assemblies as mission ground and to establish partnerships with them.

The Assembly Elders of Malaysia had commissioned a task force of leaders specially tasked to study, facilitate, equip and provide resources to the smaller assemblies, in partnership with CBSM trustees at the ALC 2021.

As of August 2022 the task force

which includes the General Secretary and Chairman of CBSM, had inducted other leaders of the assemblies willing to provide time and effort to revitalise the small assemblies who need assistance. The members of the task force are as follows; Chiew Sai Kee, Teo Pek Bing, Peter Tan, Ronny Low, Dr. Khong YL and Dexter Ng.


Initiatives To Assist Assemblies


The following initiatives were initiated and are at various stages of implementation.

- Training and Teaching Programmes: Building healthy churches by MPI, SOTS, Intentional discipleship
- 2. Providing funds when needed. (Training, to support mission programs, community projects, etc)
- 3. Identifying and encouraging mission programs
- 4. Short-term workers (ongoing recruitment)
- Full-time workers. (Commitment to fund them well; work with agencies like MMS in the event we are able to get FT workers)
- CBSM is preparing a proposed FT workers support guideline ("Salary", benefits, terms of "employment")

Partnership and Vision

 To revitalise the small assemblies, the task force will coordinate partnership with the English, Chinese and Tamil speaking assemblies in sending workers into the





field. We will train, equip and fund full time workers (short term and long term) for church planting and revitalising small assemblies in Malaysia in partnership with CASM and Tamil assemblies.

2. Our vision is to maintain and grow the assembly gospel witness in Malaysia through the existing assemblies and explore church planting initiatives in Malaysia.

The Strategic Plan

We intend to conduct further discussions with assembly elders to convince them to see the vision of revitalization for their assembly. To explore community needs in specific localities, considering the cultural and demographic needs.

Assemblies have to assess their strengths and available resources. The task force will offer collaboration with elders to teach evangelism for the church to effectively reach the community with the gospel.

The Four Point Action Plan

The task force has introduced the four point action plan to assemblies interested to participate in the church revitalization effort. Assemblies will have to agree to the plan below and be committed to participate actively for a 2 year period.

 Assemblies must sign up to the Revitalization Program (Focused on a Clusters of 3 Assemblies at any one time)

- Mission teams drawn from Malaysian assemblies will be formed to participate with each participating assembly.
- Formulation of church based strategic plan with participating assemblies, with quarterly action plan and review.
- 4. Full-time staff search for workers who will commit to a minimum of 2 year with CBSM, to be assigned to assemblies who have signed up.

Our Intentional Journey

- 1. Visits to Assemblies began according to regions (Northern, Perak & East Coast) and continue to take place today.
- Data gathered: Leaders, Leadership structure, leadership succession plans, ministries and philosophy of their ministries (how to meet needs of the community), evangelism efforts, needs (ex.

- Skills like IT skills, FT worker, training both classroom and on the ground approach, ...), demographic information including the needs of the community.
- 3. The task force initiated through CBSM a partnership with CASM to appeal for the funding for the revitalising the small assemblies which includes equipping, training and provision of full time workers assigned to these assemblies

LAUNCHING OF THE CHURCH REVITALIZATION PROGRAM

The Task Force sought the support of the Assembly Leaders Conference 2022 in launching the Church Revitalization Program. Our partnership with CASM to participate in the Full Time Workers and Theological Study Fund. We continue to pray for the assemblies in Malaysia to work together to establish our witness in the country. To God be the Glory.

Sports Ministry Outreach – Klang Jaya Gospel Chapel

Spreading the Gospel is the primary mission of every church and smaller assemblies, particularly those located in residential communities who do have an advantage, since they're already surrounded by people who need to hear The Word. The key in reaching out is by being relevant to the community. Of course, there are many avenues to reach out, and one sure way is through sports.

Now there can always be a tendency to "follow" what other assemblies do, especially so when we see some being very successful at it, but it is key to understand the demographic and interests of the community where the Lord has placed us in. This is the hard part, as it involves attempting a few things and isolating those that work and being open to "canning" those that don't. For our assembly at Klang Jaya, we started looking at avenues using sports, especially when we see Captain ball being popular among our assemblies. That was one obvious sport we engaged in, starting with the youth. Alongside this, we also kicked off Futsal and Badminton, seeing that there were different groups who were interested enough to start. The objective - to bring people in, engage with those who are not Christians, build friendships and relationships and introduce Christ to them through those relationships. This was about eight years ago.

Fast forward to today – we have since "canned" Captain ball and Futsal, although once in a while we would play those sports, as they were not sustainable with poor turnout and interest, but we were surprised that here in Klang, badminton really took off! There were enough people in the church who would be regulars, and right now, we play weekly, with a turnout of between 12-20 players, more than half of whom do not go to church or have trusted in Christ. One of the ways we engage people is by inviting those in twos or small groups at the courts to join us weekly, where we also subsidise the court rentals. Church members who play are also reminded of the primary mission and are encouraged to befriend and establish good relationships with all who join in.

To date, we typically play in 3-4 courts each week and over the years, we have had the opportunity to reach out and share The Word with those who joined us. Some have stepped in to assist with our Vacation Bible School activities. As we discuss these activities by the courtside, they in turn will hear the gospel as they assist in the activities. There are also many whom we've been able to successfully invite to church for major events like Easter and Christmas. These are individuals who on a normal day



would not step into a church but because now they're being invited to attend by people whom they're already familiar with, it is no longer as intimidating as it would have been. The gospel is preached and is heard, and we trust that the Lord will cause the seed to grow in His time.

The work has not been easy as it requires the commitment of the church members involved to be available every week and also make the effort to befriend new people quite regularly, but we've seen the Lord work through this ministry. In fact, this is the one activity that has seen the least number of cancellations. In the last eight years, it has only been cancelled when the

government disallowed sports during the Covid pandemic (it would reopen as soon as the government lifted restrictions), which is saying a lot.

We are aware that ministries and opportunities are also constantly shifting, so while this works now, we will continue to use it to reach out, but we will continue to keep an open mind, listening to the Spirit's prompting, always looking for new ways to connect to the community around us, always looking for any way which we can use to share the gospel of Christ. The church in a community needs to remain relevant and shine for our Master.

Full-Time Workers and Theological Training Fund (FTWTTF)

The Chinese Assemblies of Malaysia started the Chinese Assemblies Secretariat of Malaysia (CASM) in the year 2017 with similar aspirations and purpose as the Christian Brethren Secretariat of Malaysia (CBSM). The constitution of the CASM provided for the setting up of a Trust Fund to help provide for full-time workers, especially for the smaller assemblies to assist in paying their emoluments. The Trust Fund also aims to provide funds for full-time workers who wish to undergo some form of training to better equip themselves for ministry. This initiative is in line with the concerns of the Chinese Assemblies pertaining to the need to encourage believers who are seeking to serve full-time and those who are already serving full-time, and at the same time help the smaller Hence, the Full-Time Workers and assemblies. Theological Training Fund (FTWTTF) was started sometime in the year 2019.

In September 2022, the English and Chinese Assemblies had a joint Assembly Leadership Conference or ALC, in Port Dickson, Negeri Sembilan. It was a historic and significant joint conference, as we came together for the first time at the national level to touch base on the same issues and challenges faced by the assemblies in our

country. The well-known and much-discussed concerns for the smaller assemblies in the country, both the English and Chinese, were again deliberated upon at length. Pressing matters such as the ageing population, urban migration, dwindling numbers of assembly members, lack of younger generations for leadership succession, and the closing of youth and Sunday School ministries require our urgent attention and prayers.

A decision was made at the conference that the English and Chinese assemblies would jointly participate in the FTWTTF, recognizing that the availability of full-time workers, God willing, be one of the measures, among others, that we can take to help smaller assemblies faced with the pressing matters mentioned above. This partnership between the English and Chinese assemblies, together with other existing organisations would augur well for full-time workers and for those who are planning to answer the Lord's call to full-time work.

The FTWTTF will be administered by a group of six trustees representing the English and Chinese Assemblies and are governed by the "Full-Time Workers and

Theological Training Fund" Trust Deed and also the Application Procedures.

- 1. Dr. Tan Chong Tin (Elder, Jalan Tiga Gospel Hall)
- 2. Choo Chee Choy (Elder, Setapak Gospel Centre)
- 3. Jacob Chia (Elder, Burmah Road Gospel Hall)

- 5. Chiew Sai Kee (Elder, Temerloh Gospel Hall)
- Dr Khong Yoon Loong (Elder, Bukit Mertajam Gospel Centre)

Briefly, the FTWTTF hopes that:

- More believers will be encouraged to consider seeking the Lord and be called to serve the Lord full-time, and
- To assist assemblies in the employment of full-time workers, by partnering with them both in terms of financial assistance and in Biblical training of full-time workers

At present, the FTWTTF is supporting two full-time workers, where we are partnering with Bukit Mertajam Gospel Centre (Chinese and English) and Taiping Gospel Hall (English) in the employment of their respective full-time workers.

The FTWTTF wishes to thank assemblies, both English and Chinese, who have contributed to the fund since its broadened inception at ALC 2022. *The Lord provides!* Pray with us that the Lord will call out more believers among the assemblies to serve Him in a full-time capacity and be willing to move out into other areas of the country, helping in church growth and possibly in the planting of new churches across the country. Pray with us for the precious group of believers who have already committed their lives to serve the Lord full-time, that the Lord will continue to lead, strengthen, and protect them.

Inspiring Story: James, Gnanamuthu Dixon (G.D. James)

1920 - 2003 Evangelist, Missionary Pioneer (AEFI), and Author. Brethren, Southeast Asia.

Gnanamuthu Dixon James was born on December 25, 1920 into a Hindu family in the town of Salem in South India. At the age of three, Gnanamuthu ("pearl of wisdom" in

Tamil) lost his mother. He was physically abused by his father, who would randomly beat him while drunk. His father moved to Malaya (now Malaysia) where Gnanamuthu continued his primary school studies.

When his father remarried, his stepmother was cold and indifferent towards Gnanamuthu. The only love he received from family was from his grandmother but alas, she was preoccupied with her own responsibilities and was not always there for him. Gnanamuthu recalled how in distress he even contemplated committing suicide but did not know how to do it.

His father wanted him to have a good education, so he was sent back to India to attend secondary school at a Christian mission school noted for its academic standing. Before Gnanamuthu went to the school, his father warned him to stay away from the "white man's religion", a reference to Christianity. Being a "good" and zealous Hindu who read the Hindu Scriptures regularly, Gnanamuthu assured his father that he would never "humiliate himself or his family by embracing a foreign religion".

Vision of the Cross

One night when Gnanamuthu was in his school dormitory, he was restless and unable to sleep. He got out of bed and reached for the Bible on his desk. The page of the Tamil Bible fell open to Isaiah chapter 53. As his eyes scanned the passage of the suffering Messiah, he saw a fleeting but real vision. He witnessed the sins that he had committed and realised his condemnation before a Holy God. Subsequently, a glorious second vision came to pass — that of Christ on the cross, bearing all Gnanamuthu's sins on His own body. Gnanamuthu described that event:

"Suddenly the room was filled with a blinding light and at the centre of the light, I saw the very form of Jesus Christ as if He were dying then and there. For the first time in my life, I realised that Jesus Christ loved me..."

That night, the life of the 17-year-old was transformed by his faith and relationship to his new Lord.

When his father became aware of his son's conversion to Christianity, he was outraged. Gnanamuthu experienced anger and maltreatment from various people because he had brought dishonour and shame to family and community. He left his uncle's home (where he stayed during school holidays) after overhearing that he might be poisoned at breakfast. He spent the first night in a railway station. For a whole year, he travelled and shared Christ in the various villages and towns near Salem, South India, many a time "without food and some days... [being sustained with] a couple of bananas and cold water".

Despite this, Gnanamuthu recalled the blessings of the early days: "But the joy and excitement of the presence of my living Lord Jesus was so real that all the privations and persecutions dwindled to nothing". The amazing thing through these witnessing experiences was that each time young Gnanamuthu, who had no theological training, shared the gospel, people - young and old turned to the Lord. Gnanamuthu would only later learn that this was because God had given him the gift of an evangelist. Another uncle and aunt who lived on the other side of the Cauvery River (South India) and a few cousins who were sympathetic to Gnanamuthu's new faith helped him to arrange open-air meetings. At one meeting, Gnanamuthu's dear old grandmother who did not seem to grasp much of the gospel acknowledged that Jesus died for her sins and that He is the only God worth worshipping. These were indeed the sweetest words that Gnanamuthu had heard in a long time.

It was during his itinerant ministry in South India that Gnanamuthu had a clear call to leave his ambitions (he had mapped out plans to become a medical doctor) and become the Lord's servant. Even though he tried to dismiss the voice of God, he finally surrendered to the Lord's promptings with the words: "Lord, I'm all yours."

Malaya

In 1941, Gnanamuthu returned to Malaya from India. He had heard that there were many South Indians living there and felt that he could witness to them while being close to his family. He was surprised at how well he was received by his family, although his father tried to lure him back into Hinduism. Gnanamuthu started sharing the gospel with relatives and friends using his father's home as the base. He taught them from the four gospels each night for six months. It was evident that the Lord's presence was with him because he saw close to 30 of his relatives (including his stepmother and eventually his father) turn from their sinful ways to place their faith in Jesus Christ.

At that time, a New Zealand couple – the Brewertons who were sent to minister to Indians – encountered Gnanamuthu and recognised God's hand upon this young man. Unknown to Gnanamuthu, Mr and Mrs E.V.

Brewerton were earnestly praying for an Indian missionary to come and help them gather the harvest among the Indian rubber plantation workers. The Brewertons had the joy of baptising some of Gnanamuthu's relatives and they also invited Gnanamuthu to join the Klang Gospel Hall where he was eventually commended as a full-time worker in mid-1941. From here on, he became known as G D James (or GD, affectionately, to close friends).

At the end of 1941, the Japanese army invaded Malaya and Singapore. During the approximately 2½ years of occupation, GD suffered privation and was in constant fear of being imprisoned or murdered by the Japanese soldiers. Despite it all, the Lord enabled him to escape several close calls and continue serving faithfully. The Lord's words of assurance: "I am with you" provided strength and stability to GD during these dark times. The leadership and shepherding responsibilities of the Klang Gospel Hall fell on the local workers because foreign missionaries were forced to leave the country. This posed a problem – GD rarely ministered in English prior to this. But he rose to the occasion – in preparation for this new phase of ministry, he would get up at 5 a.m. most mornings to study and master the English language.

In August 1943, two years before the surrender of the Japanese forces, GD married Roseline Simon (affectionately known as Rose), a Malayan Indian girl who came from a well-known Christian family. It was an auspicious occasion as Elder Lim Chin Kheng officiated at the wedding in the company of family and members from the surrounding Brethren assemblies. God blessed GD and Rose with six children. According to Elder Dr Lawrence Chan of Singapore, GD's success in his family life in raising all his children to love the Lord is mainly attributed to Rose who played "a crucial role" as she impressed on the children to cleave to the Lord. Four of their six children were born in Klang while the remaining two were born in Singapore after GD received a "Macedonian call" in 1951 from various leaders, including a medical missionary, Dr. G.P. Bardsley, to relocate there and eventually serve at the Bethesda Gospel Hall (now Ang Mo Kio Assembly) as a commended worker.

Singapore

Using the Bethesda Gospel Hall as a ministry base, GD preached tirelessly and became well known in the Brethren assemblies in Singapore and Malaysia. Invitations soon came from other denominational churches for GD to conduct gospel and Bible teaching meetings. His evangelistic gift was recognised and greatly appreciated, and the Gospel Hall released him to conduct crusades and rallies in India, Indonesia, and other Southeast Asian countries. He continued to travel to Malaya regularly, sometimes with a male voice choir from Singapore headed by Robert Tan of Bethesda Gospel Hall.

During one of these visits to Malaysia in 1960, GD sustained a heart attack and was rushed to Singapore's General Hospital. While in the hospital, GD took stock of his ministry before the Lord. One night while still in hospital, he saw a vision of people hastening to a Christless eternity and he sensed that the Lord was prompting him to train others instead of merely serving as an itinerant evangelist. GD realised that the best way forward was to form a national mission organisation to train Asians to reach Asia. Despite all the obstacles and with less than \$50 in the bank account, GD founded the Malaysia Evangelistic Fellowship (MEF) in August 1960. Nine leaders from various evangelical churches formed the first committee, including S. Dhanabalan who would later join the Singapore government as a Cabinet minister.

The work of MEF then spread to Indonesia and India in the early 1970s, so the name was changed to Asia Evangelistic Fellowship (AEF). Local evangelists like Tan Kok Beng were enlisted to preach at Gospel rallies, initially in Singapore and later in other parts of Asia, while Peck Hock Cheng, his wife Suat Mui, and Herbert Woon were sent from Singapore to Brunei as missionaries. Even so, GD's vision was for Asian nationals in their own countries to reach their people in culturally sensitive ways. He continued to conduct gospel crusades in the key cities of Asia and saw large crowds gathering and hundreds coming to Christ. In India and Indonesia, churches, Bible colleges, and preaching bands came into being because of his crusades. The Singapore ministry continued to grow as specialised evangelists were added to the ranks to reach out to children, young people, and dialect-speaking Chinese communities.

Sydney, Australia

In 1977, due to his heart condition, GD was advised by his doctors to relocate to Sydney, Australia (where the weather was more temperate and the pace of life less hectic). GD saw this as an opportunity to reach out to the Asians in Australia and to extend AEF's ministry to Australian Christians. He set up the board of AEF Australia made up of key Christian leaders and professionals. Unknown to him, this was a strategic move of God to prepare AEFI to be later domiciled in Australia when the Singapore government introduced the Charities Act of 1995 whereby only 20% of locally raised funds could be remitted outside of Singapore.

In Sydney, GD became an elder of the Epping Gospel Chapel and counselled Asian students at Macquarie University. He also established various ministry initiatives for the Vietnamese, Cambodian, Sri Lankan, and other Asian communities across Australia.

GD continued visits to Singapore and other Asian countries and embarked on new initiatives such as convening the first Indian Diaspora conference in Singapore in June 1980

with 100 delegates from 11 countries. In May 1985, GD and the AEF leaders organised the Conference of National Evangelists (CONE) in Singapore to identify and equip 150 emerging evangelists from Asia.

In 1990, AEFI appointed GD's youngest son Jonathan, as international director of the mission, based in Singapore. GD continued as president (a non-executive role), preaching the Word and promoting the mission. From 1989-1999, he conducted several "Love Missions" in various key cities in Asia and Australia. In 1989, he took a team of 12 Asian preachers to several cities in the United Kingdom and France for the "Love UK Mission". Pastor Neo Ban It of Singapore, one of the associate preachers at the Love UK Mission, testified that this was a "high point" in his life and ministry – to travel to the land of Wesley and Whitefield and preach the same gospel.

GD was first and foremost an evangelist. His simple and winsome messages based on the death and resurrection of Christ were powerful, anointed, and effective. Every time he preached a gospel message, there were pockets of people or large crowds that were convicted of their sin and need of a Saviour. He started his ministry as a Tamil preacher but was constrained during the Japanese occupation of Malaya to preach and write in English. GD described his efforts in learning to preach in English:

"I tried to preach using the best of phrases and words in the English language... sadly people were impressed... but no lives were changed. I fasted and prayed, and the Lord impressed upon me the need to preach Christ in simplicity and clarity with total dependence on God — not to add anything or take away anything."

God honoured this stand as thousands of people were touched by the powerful message of the Saviour. Eternity will reveal the broad sweep of precious souls from many nations who have come to know the Lord Jesus through his faithful ministry. Australian evangelist Bill Newman described GD as a "flame for God in Asia... [and] to so many parts of our world".

There are many notable evangelists, but few were used by God to spearhead and launch missionary movements. GD's vision for AEFI came at a time when there were very few national workers and missionaries serving God in their own Asian countries and when foreign mission agencies were not ready to accept local Asian workers to serve in their ranks.

AEFI has grown exponentially since its humble inception with more than 200 national workers serving today in 11 countries in Asia and beyond – even reaching the shores of North America where there is a thriving diaspora ministry to Asians. AEFI is now in regions and countries such as Northeast India, China, Nepal, and Myanmar, where GD had not set foot during his lifetime.

GD began writing tracts in English in the early 1950s. He then edited a quarterly magazine, *The Gospel Challenge*, for many years and went on to write 24 books. His book *Words of Comfort* written after a fiery trial brought immense blessing to many people. A medical student in India was on the verge of committing suicide but after reading the book, he gave himself to the Lord and changed the course of his life. Similarly, a corporate executive, Jacob Samuel in Mumbai came to the Lord after reading this book. GD's signature booklet *The Man You Must Confront* has been printed and translated into more than 13 languages with more than 10 million copies in circulation.

Amazingly, even though GD founded AEFI, he was not "one-eyed" about the mission. He spent as much time building up and encouraging other agencies such as the Bible Society (Singapore), Keswick Convention Committee (Singapore), Haggai Ministries, OMF (Singapore Home Council), Eagles Communications and Every Home for Christ (Australia), to name a few. He encouraged younger leaders, pastors, and evangelists all over Asia and Australia. In the last five to six years of his life, he devoted his time in prayer for international Christian leaders and met with several key leaders in Australia regularly in an informal mentoring capacity.

Alan Harley (theologian and former director of AEF Australia) in his summation of GD's life referred to St. Patrick who was known as the apostle of Ireland, Bernard Gilpin as the apostle of the North and William Carey as the apostle of India. In the same way, Harley likened G.D. James in that line of apostolic succession: "GD began his ministry as a result of a direct confrontation with the living Lord, he was compelled to take the gospel to his own people, he has travelled the world to preach Christ, he has established a network known as AEFI from which colleges and churches have been established and the fruit remains".

Deathbed: Final vision

G D James died in Sydney on July 24, 2003. One of his spiritual sons, David Lim (formerly from Singapore) was at his bedside in hospital and testified that GD asked for pen and paper to write something he saw. But he was too weak to write a single word. Lim shared that GD saw a vision of the Lord and the prophet Elijah but was struggling to communicate this. Shortly after this incident, GD left this world, holding onto his Bible, having completed more than 60 years of faithful gospel ministry through preaching, writing, and training leaders.

Ten memorial services were held to celebrate his life and ministry in Sydney and Perth (Australia); Singapore; Kuala Lumpur (Malaysia); Auckland (New Zealand); Mumbai and Dimapur (India); Kathmandu (Nepal); Yangon, (Myanmar) and Surabaya (Indonesia). In the Christian community in

Singapore and in many parts of Asia and the world, he is considered a legend because of his extensive influence and prolific contribution to the missionary enterprise of the Church.

<u>Note</u>: **Jonathan James** is the youngest son of G.D. James. He was previously the associate pastor of the Swanston Street Church of Christ (now CrossCulture Church of Christ) in Melbourne, Australia and is currently the executive president of AEFI.

A Special Tribute to Peter Ferry

Peter Ferry went to be with the Lord on July 19th, 2023, after serving the Lord faithfully for 64 years in Thailand and other parts of Asia. He was born in Glasgow, Scotland, on 28 June 1934, the fourth child of six children.

He was sent by his local Assembly in Scotland and has been associated with Echoes of Service (now called Echoes International)

since 1959. He became a Christian as a young man and was mentored by his older brother. As a young Christian he was actively involved in evangelism and bible-study, but at the time felt called to the British Army.

As a young 19-year-old soldier he was first sent to Berlin, where he quickly became involved with the local church and would also volunteer in the refugee camps when he was off-duty. It was during this time that God spoke very clearly to him about leaving the army and going into full-time Christian work as a missionary.

As he still had some time left to serve, he went next to Malaya, the country



where he met his future wife, Peggy. In the jungle he would read his Bible and pray every night, and soon his fellow soldiers asked him to read out loud and pray for them.

After leaving the army he went as a missionary to South Thailand. After completing language study, he and Peggy moved to Krabi and were involved initially in pioneer work. As the assemblies there and in Phuket grew, Peter's ministry became more bible-teaching and training of local workers. Most of these assemblies have grown significantly and now have gifted local leadership.

Peter was a gifted bible-teacher and frequently taught in Malaysia and Singapore. In 1973, the Lord took him to Burma (now called Myanmar) where he was able to help the small fellowship, giving bible-teaching, training as well as taking in Burmese bibles. He continued to visit Burma several times a year for years. The assembly in Rangoon is now flourishing and has since planted several churches.



In the late 1970's-early 1980's Peter and Peggy felt the Lord calling them to Sri Lanka. They were able to help and encourage the church there and see it grow, as well as start the Emmaus work there. Peter and Peggy continued to visit Sri Lanka for many years. In addition to the gifted public speaker and bible-teacher most of us know and are familiar with, Peter was also involved with pastoral work, visiting the sick and elderly and doing bible-teaching at home. He was always a disciplined man who got up at 4am or 5am and made prayer a priority in his life.

During these last two years when he was unable to serve the Lord in more active ways, he spent them praying even more diligently for family, local believers, the church and global affairs.

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Koh Gim Lam's Ministry in Cameron Highland, Malaysia

We are privileged to write about our Brother Koh Gim Lam's ministry in Cameron Highlands, Pahang, Malaysia.

Koh Gim Lam's Testimony

1965-1966 were very traumatic years for me. I started teaching in Tengku Ahmad Secondary School in the Cameron Highlands in 1965. Because of lots of personal struggles, I went into drinking and gambling and were often drunk and having gambling debts.

A bright spot during that period was that I came to know Dr. Bobby Sng Ewe Kong and Dr. Ivy Peck. Through their friendship and witnessing both in words and through their lifestyle, I was very attracted to the Christian message. Through a wonderful chain of events, I made a confession of faith on 4th July 1966.

Again, through a wonderful chain of events, I resigned as a government servant and took up the appointment of a youth worker with the Scripture Union Malaysia. Those were great years of the Inter-school Christian Fellowships and camps. We saw hundreds coming to the Lord each year through these activities and many of these ISCFers became leaders in the universities and the local churches.

On 1st January 1985, I stepped into the shoes of the very well-loved, Rev. Peter Young and took up the position as the National Director (then, it was known as General Secretary), and served in that position until 1st Jan 1993, when I was appointed as the Regional Director of Scripture Union East and West Asia. In the 90s, many closed countries in Asia began to open up. The Lord gave me the joy of seeing Scripture Union beginning in Myanmar, Cambodia, Vietnam (restarting work that was stopped during the war years), Mongolia, China, Loas, Kyrgyzstan and Turkey.

Each movement has an exciting story of its beginning, especially of God sending the right people to the right places at the right time. I retired from the Scripture Union on 31st December 2010, a very satisfied staff worker! While with the Scripture Union I served the local churches as much as I could and was later made an elder of Petaling Jaya Gospel Hall. During that period, I carved out times to

complete my M. Min and DD. I also served as one of the Founding Board members of OM, Malaysia. Whenever opportunities were opened for me, I was more than delighted to share in overseas conferences, for example Overseas Christian Fellowship Conventions.

When I retired from Scripture Union, I moved to the Cameron Highlands and continued to have an active teaching ministry in both local churches and Orang Asli churches and also from time to time in Bible teaching events. During the Covid pandemic years, together with a small group of retirees, I started the KOMUNITI BANTUAN DAN PENDIDIKAN ORANG ASAL (KBP). In the Pendidikan (Education) program, KBP started kindergartens and tuition centres in the kampung.

To date we have 12 kindergartens/tuition centres and 4 more pending. The other area of concern was the Bible listening program with the introduction of the audio Bible. To date we have distributed well over 2000 sets. For the Bantuan (Aids) program, we concentrated on giving milk powder to mothers with infants. At the moment, there are a total of 25 teachers, assistants and staff workers serving with KBP full time.

I never expected that in my retirement years I can still have such an active life and to see God's good hands through KBP. What a privilege to be a child of God and part of His "grey power team" on earth! I am 78 years old in 2023.

Komuniti Bantuan dan Pendidikan Orang Asal (KBP)

Komuniti Bantuan dan Pendidikan Orang Asal (KBP) was initially set up to respond to the Covid pandemic that affected so many OA kampungs in the Cameron HIghlands District. KBP has evolved from that to focus on 3 main areas of concern: -

1) Pendidikan (Education)

During our visits to the remote kampungs to bring them food and medicine, we noticed so many school going children were not in school. When asked, nearly all the parents replied, 'anak kurang faham' and for that they

dropped out after 2 or 3 years in school. This led KBP to establish preschool centres for children between 5 to 6 years old, to prepare them for primary school education. At the moment we have 4 paid staff as teacher assistants and two full time staff workers visiting these centres and helping the teacher assistants.

Another small ministry in the education department we conducted was vocational training. We have just done two - motorcycle maintenance workshop and seminar for potential preschool teachers. Both were very well received. We are now seeking God's direction whether to respond to the request to start a school in a Bateq village with more than 100 children below 12 years who are not attending school.

2) Audio Bible Ministry

This Ministry came about through our visits to the remote kampungs during the pandemic. Many kampung, even those with churches, received totally no spiritual input for 2 years.

That led us to send audio Bibles to some of these kampung. We developed a listening plan. To date we have distributed nearly 2,000 audio Bibles to more than 1,000 OA families. Our staff travels to the various kampung to teach them to get the most out of the audio Bible.

3) Bantuan (Giving Aids Ministry)

- a. We continue to distribute food stuff and medicine and used materials that are in good condition given to us either by
 - i. bringing them to the remote kampungs or
 - ii. the leaders come to our Pusat Pembekalan Makanan dan Ubat-ubatan to collect them.
- b. distributing milk powder to mothers with babies below a year old and expectant mother.
- c. we give a glass of milk and hopefully soon, an egg a day to our preschool children in the centres.

Pray with us and for us in KBP.

Side by side with OA leaders and believers, our mission is to glorify our Lord Jesus Christ and illuminate His presence in the remote and dense forests of Perak, Pahang, and Negeri Sembilan.

Orang Asli - Their Struggles

The Orang Asli are the indigenous inhabitants of Malaysia, aptly named as the "original people" or "aboriginal people" in Malay. Their diverse existence spans the various regions of Malaysia, encompassing states such as Johor, Kelantan, Pahang, Perak, Selangor, Negeri Sembilan and Terengganu.

According to the latest census conducted by the Department of Statistics Malaysia in 2020, the Orang Asli population stands at approximately 178,000, a relatively small fraction of Malaysia's overall population, estimated

at around 32 million. Nevertheless, the Orang Asli are integral to Malaysia's cultural tapestry, holding the esteemed position of indigenous peoples. Comprisi ng 18 distinct subgroups within the Negrito (Semang), Senoi, and Aboriginal-Malay categories, they account for 0.7% of Peninsular Malaysia's population. The Orang Asli possess their unique languages, cultures, and customs.

Starkly revealing, virtually all Orang Asli households fall within the income bracket of the poorest 40% of Malaysians, according to the Centre for Orang Asli Concerns. This means that 99.29% of these households earn less than RM4,000 per month, placing them in the B40 category.

The Orang Asli have endured a long and arduous history marked by marginalisation, discrimination, and the relentless challenge of preserving their traditional way of life. They have confronted the grim spectres of forced relocations, land confiscations, and merciless exploitation. Bereft of their ancestral lands, they stand vulnerable to disease and societal exclusion, grappling with discrimination and a dearth of educational opportunities.

In the present day, the Orang Asli continue to confront an array of challenges. The unresolved land rights issue looms large, as they strive to assert their ownership and safeguard their territories from external interests. Discrimination and marginalisation persist, leading to social and economic isolation. The spectres of poverty, inadequate access to essential services, and an underdeveloped healthcare infrastructure exacerbate their already disadvantaged circumstances. Education remains an uphill battle, with limited opportunities for quality learning and scant resources for secondary



education. Health concerns, including malnutrition and infectious diseases, further compound their struggles.

The Orang Asli remain a precious jewel in Malaysia's cultural mosaic, bearing unique traditions, languages, and customs that serve as a potent reminder of the nation's rich historical and cultural diversity. By nurturing and supporting the Orang Asli, we ensure that their voices and contributions resonate through the annals of time.

Opportunities to Make a Difference

Hope is closer than we realise. At PMOAM, we firmly believe in the transformative power of the Gospel. We persist in sharing the love of Christ and sharing the hope of the Gospel to the Orang Asli, whom our Lord holds dear.

Our commitment transcends physical aid. We actively seek opportunities to share the life-altering message of Jesus Christ, recognizing that true healing and new beginnings emerge from a personal connection with Him. Through outreach, fellowship, and discipleship, we guide them toward a deeper comprehension of God's love and the hope embedded in His teachings.

SIOA Perak is led by Bah Ngah, with Rolisa as his deputy. SIOA Pahang is headed by Nor Yuasra (Ngai), with Hermanila (Man) as his deputy. As our ministry progresses, the need for more workers becomes apparent to cover these extensive regions.

We also strive to supply resources that address their specific needs, spanning education and healthcare.
- 3. **Empowering**: We firmly believe in empowering individuals within these communities to seize control of their lives and create positive change. This may involve mentorship, training, and discipleship to enhance their skills and fulfil their aspirations. Throughout the year, numerous training sessions were held in both Tapah and Temerloh. A notable achievement was our inaugural OA Leaders Retreat from July 24 to 26, 2023, at Beacon Resort. This retreat, themed "Unity & Humility" (Ephesians 4:2-3), aimed to empower leadership, foster fellowship, and ignite the passion to reach out to OA communities.



4. Encouraging and Celebrating: Celebrating the strengths and accomplishments of individuals within these communities can convey hope and encouragement. Acknowledging their tenacity and dedication can make them feel valued and inspire them to continue their pursuit of success.



5. Sharing the Gospel: Collaborating with OA believers in spreading the message of the Gospel and the enduring hope it carries is one of the most profound ways to convey hope. By sharing Jesus' love and His message of salvation, we can offer enduring hope that transcends earthly circumstances. Each year, many come to know the Lord, and new outreach centres are established.

Leaving a Legacy for the OA

Gospel Hall Kuala Lumpur and The Arrival of a Giant Immediate Neighbour: Merdeka 118

Merdeka 118 towering over GHKL



This article is written for the purpose of sharing the and communication development of neighbourly relationship between Gospel Hall Kuala Lumpur (GHKL) and Merdeka 118 (formerly known as Warisan Merdeka Tower, KL 118 and PNB 118), a 118-story

megatall skyscraper in Kuala Lumpur. At 678.9 m (2,227 ft) tall, it is the second-tallest structure and the second-tallest building in the world, behind the Burj Khalifa at 828 m (2,717 ft). It all began in April, 2017, GHKL received an invitation letter to discuss the Impact of KL118 Warisan Merdeka Tower Construction at Jalan Stadium, Kuala Lumpur.

LAND ACQUISITION

Since then, during 2022, due to changes to Jalan Hang Jebat (the public road where GHKL is located), 26.411 Sq metres (284 Sq Feet) of GHKL land has been acquired under the Land Acquisition (Act 1960) (Act A999. This land portion is located exactly where the main entrance to GHKL sits and is becoming part of an extended public road junction. As a result of the land acquisition, PNB Merdeka Ventures Sdn Bhd had constructed a new access and installed the entrance gate for GHKL, about 3 metres away along the parameters. The planning for the new GHKL entrance had involved several on-site meetings and follow up correspondents. With the new entrance, internal traffic routing has been adjusted as well as displacement of several parking lots.

However, with the new entrance being very close to the new public road junction (which, at the time of writing, is yet to be commissioned), it is felt that there may be safety concerns. Such concerns were highlighted early in the process of initial planning with PNB Merdeka Ventures Sdn Bhd and, in fact, the provision of a second entrance/gate was agreed. This proposed requirement is pending further assessments and application to DBKL which may be an onerous task.

The land acquisition involved is the second such experience for GHKL in 10 years. The first time being an acquisition of 495 sq metres along the frontage of the property affected by Mass Rail Transit (MRT) tunnels.

Throughout the processes of these land acquisition, we are grateful to have the services of established land valuation and legal representations. Their professional services have ensured proper documentation of needs, requirements and concerns, be it in Minutes of Meeting or follow up letters. For quick and cordial communication, albeit informal, we have also maintained exchanges of "Whatsapp" messages with frontline personnel in PNB118, land valuation and the lawyer's office. We are also thankful for the practical stakeholder support of Christian Brethren Malaysia Property Trust Bhd (CBMPTB) as legal land owner in a timely and efficient manner.

NEIGHBOURLY COMMUNICATION

In the early stage of Merdeka 118 development, the leadership of GHKL and that of other neighbouring establishments were invited in turn to a briefing on the project. One of the questions we asked was whether the project will in time turn the vicinity into an upscale commercial hub like that of Kuala Lumpur City Centre (KLCC). We were happy to hear that the Merdeka 118 project is intended to be different and will not adversely impact the neighbouring area.

In 2022, with the main tower nearing completion, the church management team was invited to a site tour.



COMMUNITY GRANT PROGRAMME

In mid-2021, "Merdeka 118 Community Grants Programme Open Day" was launched with the objective of "Merdeka 118 to connect and create a symbiotic relationship with the surrounding community through investing in economic resiliency, public spaces and social and cultural assets within the precinct."

GHKL's "Community Ministry Dept " took the opportunity to apply for funding to refurbish the basketball court. This court has been a source of ministry services over many decades. Due to the lack of open space in the neighbourhood, prayer is to be able to continue making good use of the Assembly property for the Gospel's sake!







Merdeka 118 also recognised the related benefits especially to the students community in the area, and approved a RM30,000 grant for the project. The final cost was close to RM60,000 topped up by GHKL Treasury.

Following the completion of the refurbishing project, an Opening cum 3 x 3 Basketball Friendly Games was held on 4th June 2022. 10 teams from schools in the neighbourhood, GHKL and ministry agency Life SOAR Resources participated with professional refereeing undertaken by Selangor Basketball Association. The event was graced by Yang Mulia Tengku Dato' Ab.Aziz Tengku Mahmud, CEO of PNB Merdeka Ventures, Deputy Head Master Liang Chan Chong, Confucius Private Secondary School and other senior officials from PNB118 agency Think City.











After the games, in conjunction with prize giving and the subsequent lunch, the background and existence of GHKL was shared via a slide presentation.





We believe such an event continues to promote goodwill with our neighbours, especially with the schools community. PNB 118 has also brought with its presence a different profile which we hope and pray will further develop in the community at large for the sake of the Gospel.

Groups of students from nearby schools, particularly Confucius Private Secondary School and Sekolah Jenis Kebangsaan (C) Confucian, continue to make use of the basketball court for their daily recreation and exercise purposes. In this connection, the GHKL Office Staffing Team has also initiated provision of simple refreshment in an effort to exercise "love and care" testimony.

The Confucius Private Secondary School also books the court for practice purposes by designated teams during their annual basketball competition season.

MERDEKA 118 COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAMME CYCLE 2

At the end of 2022, the Cycle 2 Grants Programme was launched. We were encouraged to apply based on our plan to establish a "GHKL Heritage Centre" which was raised earlier. However, we were unsuccessful and were informed that:

"This is not a reflection of the value of your project, however given the number of quality submissions received, the number of grants we could approve was limited. It is our hope that you will be able to obtain support from other sources."

Anyway, this grant application outcome is not a major measure nor determinant of GHKL's mission of The Gospel as by the Grace of God, the "GHKL Heritage Centre" Project is already underway.

LAND ACQUISITION COMPENSATION

Based on the result of the Land Office Hearings, GHKL was compensated a certain amount for, basically, the land acquired. However, with due advice by the land valuation and legal professionals we are working on one specific area of compensation, i.e. "impact on remaining land", as we understand, has not been adequately or equitably dealt with, resulting in inadequate compensation.

Hence, an "Appeal Process" has been initiated and is ongoing. We trust this process will bring about a favourable outcome, simply based on the understanding and application of the relevant legal avenue that is available to us. In the process, one professional consideration of good land/resources management in relation to future needs and value has been highlighted. Such a consideration is not without Biblical context as we strive to be relevant in the

mission of bearing witnesses for The Gospel in changing and challenging times, as Paul gave Timothy clear instructions concerning the management of the heresy and the preaching of the true Gospel of Christ, and in 1 Timothy 1:18 . Paul reminds Timothy of his

obligation to The Gospel because of his call to serve Christ by stating, "Timothy, my son, I give you this instruction in keeping with the prophecies once made about you, so that by following them you may fight the good fight."

One of the big take-home messages from ALC 2022 was that education is an excellent bridge to reach out to the local community, especially in the smaller towns. A couple of months

after the ALC, we were approached by one of the leaders of Agape Care to provide financial support for their education ministry called Solid Rock, among refugees and disadvantaged children in the local community.

Agape Care is a Christian NGO that has been running various ministries in Melaka ranging from outreach to the elderly to single mothers and students for more than a decade. At present, we do not have a formal bridging ministry in education, largely due to the lack of human resources, so we saw the potential for a mutually beneficial partnership, not simply in financial support but also in terms of gospel outreach.

Our involvement with Solid Rock since January 2023 is with the weekday after-school programme section, which provides homework support and tuition for kids from disadvantaged backgrounds. Solid Rock has approximately 20 students who are divided into two classes and supported by two paid teachers and a principal. The main spiritual input is a weekly chapel attended by all the students.

When we discovered that there was no established outreach programme for these largely unchurched children on weekends and school holidays, we discussed a strategic alliance with Agape Care to engage with the children as well as their family members. Thus far, we have had an additional 5-7 children regularly attending our Children's Hour on Saturdays and a larger number of them who have attended our special kids' gospel events.

Our prayer is that we will be able to include a growing number of these children in outings and evangelistic camps in the future. There are also ongoing opportunities to connect with siblings and parents of these children. We praise God that this new initiative has spurred several people from our assembly to serve at our Children's Hour. God willing, this partnership with Agape Care and Solid Rock will provide an impetus for the establishment of a formal education ministry at Melaka Gospel Chapel.

Please join us in prayer that God will raise up more workers who will be passionate about delivering high-quality education and to reap a harvest among the children and youths in our local community.

StarKids - Christian Brethren Mission Preschool

In the article "Christian Brethren Involvement in Education" (CBIE) which was published in the May/June 2013 issue of *Diakonia*, I mentioned that the

Christian Brethren Education Board (CBEB) managed to take back about one acre of under-utilised land from our Bukit Bintang Primary School located at PJ Section 8. Our plan was to continue our Christian Brethren mission through education. That was exactly 10 years ago.


The work began with CBSM bringing together the church leaders from the 3 Anchor Assemblies — Petaling Jaya Gospel Hall, The Life Chapel, and SS Gospel Centre, educators and concerned church members to explore what God would have us use the land and the old classrooms for. The final decision was to set up a Christian Brethren Mission Preschool to continue the legacy of our Brethren involvement in missions through the education of the young and needy.











A special task force was set up -

- 1) to seek God's guidance and blessings
- 2) to work on the renovation needed
- to raise funding from our assemblies and individual Christians
- 4) to apply for the school licence
- 5) to get the school curriculum ready.



This was the beginning of an unknown journey for the task team. Even the education authorities were unsure how to deal with our applications as there had been no precedent where part of the land of an existing mission school would be taken back for a private school. We had to overcome many obstacles. Nonetheless, the task and prayer team moved forward in faith. Our assemblies and concerned individuals donated generously and the funds were enough for the renovation, equipment and teaching aids. Our application for a licence was finally approved by the Ministry of Education (MOE) in December 2012, and StarKids began operations in January 2013 with an enrolment of 8 students in well-equipped air-conditioned classrooms. God's help was evident throughout this journey of faith.

The enrollment increased gradually in the first 6 years and reached a peak of 65 students in 2019. Many children-friendly outdoor facilities were gradually set up on part of the re-possessed land near the classrooms.



A popular outdoor programme was incorporated into the weekly curriculum. The 4 old classrooms and empty land became a happy place, filled with children's laughter and excitement as they grow, play and learn. Fishes, tadpoles, birds, rabbits, tortoises, and butterflies can be found in the compound, and are useful for teaching "God loves his creation" and "Be kind to animals."

Over the last 10 years, about 150 children have passed through the school. Besides growing in mind and body in a healthy environment through the academic and outdoor curriculum, Christian culture and values were inculcated in them.

Major Disruptions and Challenges

The enrollment experienced a gradual decline after this peak in 2019. The Covid-19 pandemic and the economic downturn caused major disruptions and uncertainties. It became very clear that the school on its own cannot sustain the operational losses. At the height of the pandemic in 2021, StarKids was closed for 3 months for evaluation and prayer. Owing to 9 parents' requests for school classes, the school resumed operations with a skeletal staff team.

StarKids at the Crossroad

A preschool operated in or by a church can look forward to support from the church in terms of enrolment of children from church families; volunteers for enrichment programmes and financial support in times of need. But, this is not the case with Star Kids, and today, the school only has an enrollment of 16 students and a team of 3 teachers, 1 assistant teacher and an office administrator. Two contract teachers are engaged to teach music and Chinese. Out of the 16 children (10 local families, 6 expatriates), only 6 are from Christian homes, 2 from the BM congregation of Kelana Jaya Gospel Centre.

A total of 30 students is needed to break even. The school is facing a shortfall of RM7,000 each month, and at this rate, our reserved funds would be used up by the end of this school year. It is clear that the school cannot continue to operate for long with such losses. This problem hangs over the head of the Board and the staff.

Ongoing action taken by the Christian Brethren Education Board and the School

- 1. Set up a special task team to study the problem and implement improvements, such as:
 - the location of the school is not close to where catchment families live;
 - assist parents who need help to solve transport issues; etc
- Review the fee structure to mitigate the effects of the economic downturn, as the school fees may have become too prohibitive to average wage-earning families after the pandemic economic downturn

- 3. Set up a special task team to study the problem and implement improvements, such as:
 - the location of the school is not close to where catchment families live;
 - assist parents who need help to solve transport issues; etc
- 4. Review the fee structure to mitigate the effects of the economic downturn, as the school fees may have become too prohibitive to average wage-earning families after the pandemic economic downturn
- 5. Make better use of the MSK Fund (a special fund to help church workers' children and needy students)
- 6. Provide after school-care service
- 7. Improve on the publicity materials and promotional efforts:
 - Signages in front of the school
 - New brochures with a stronger emphasis on the Christian identity of the school
 - Review, update and improve on the information on our website, Facebook, etc. with additional video material
 - Increase the exposure of the school to more parents through special activities and programmes for children and parents which are open to the public – such as "Jungle Adventure", Inter-church/Community Games and Special Talks for parents

The School Board of *Star Kids* is made up of members from the different Brethren assemblies in Malaysia, and they are accountable to CBEBT which manages the mission preschool on behalf of the Christian Brethren Property Trust.

The CBEBT Trustees have decided to conduct a major review and evaluation of the steps taken to increase student enrolment of *Star Kids* at the end of this year and what further action to take with regard to how best to go about saving our Christian Brethren Mission Preschool.

For the last few months, the Trustee members have come together every week to pray for our mission schools,

especially for *Star Kids* and also for other preschools operated by our assemblies: *Tadika Sungai Nibong* (Sungai Nibong Gospel Hall), *St. Marks Kindergarten* (Taiping Gospel Hall), *Kings Kid* (SS Gospel Centre) and *Shalom* (Sungei Way Christian Church) as we bravely face the challenges of continuing Christian Brethren involvement in mission through education.

Please pray for all of us.



Children's Corner, SS Gospel Centre, Petaling Jaya

The Children's Corner is a play school for toddlers aged 2 to 4 years old, accompanied by a parent. It is held every Tuesday and Friday from 9:30 am - 11:30 am.

This outreach ministry was started in 1998, following the footsteps of Jalan Gasing Gospel Hall who initiated the idea. We are now 25 years strong this year.

The objectives of the Children's Corner are:

- To encourage early childhood development;
- To serve as a support group for full time mothers;
- To serve as an outreach ministry in the community; and
- To introduce the children to our Kindergarten (KKEY) and to our Sunday School (King's Kids).



Our team consists of teachers and helpers, teachers doing the singing and lesson proper and helpers to set up and clear up the place. All are volunteers, no qualifications are required just a heart for children and God's work.

Due to space limitations, we can only accommodate a maximum of 20 children, but a good number would be between 12 to 15 children for best interaction. At present, we have 10 children attending our play school, with a

good mix of Christian and non-Christian children, though preference will be given to non-Christian children especially if there is a waitlist.







Our activities and programmes are summarised below:

Time	Activities
9:30 am - 10:15 am (45 mins)	Free Play This is a time where the parent and child have access to apparatus and toys on the shelves. These activities are to encourage living skills, dexterity and coordination amongst others, and the child is to be supervised by the parent.

Time	Activities	
9:15 am – 9:30 am (15 mins)	Circle Time A short time of singing, led by a teacher and includes both parent and child participation.	
9:30 am - 9:45 am (15 mins)	Snack Light snack is served and only the children sit and eat together.	
9:45 am - 10:05 am (20 mins)	Play time Children play together with selected activities or toys for the day. The parents have their own coffee time, to encourage separation of sorts from the child. This is to cultivate individual social interaction and skills in young children.	
10:05 am - 11:30 am (25 mins)	Story/Lesson/Craft We end the session with a short story or lesson plus craft. The stories can be from favourite children's books or the Bible. Both parent and child sit together for this activity.	

Besides the above, we have special theme play, like Gym play, Home Living, Music & Movement, Water Play, Art Work, as well as picnics and outings, field trips to bird parks, petting zoos, fire station, and even to the dentist, to name a few.

Throughout the years, a number of these children have joined our Sunday School and KKEY kindergarten. In addition, a number of moms have gone back to their own church and initiated their own playgroups, whereas a few churches had sought our assistance in starting similar playgroups in their premises.

All glory goes to the Lord, for His faithfulness and providence of teachers, helpers, children, parents and grandparents.











Toddlers Playgroup, Bandar Puchong Gospel Centre

Bandar Puchong Gospel Centre's (BPGC) Toddlers Playgroup is an outreach programme to the community around the Puchong area, targeting toddlers from 2 - 3 years old. Toddlers have to be accompanied by either parents or grandparents.

The class schedule includes sessions for sensory activities, music and movements, lessons, craft and playtime.



This also includes an intentional way of introducing basic Bible truths through Bible stories, scripture verses and songs to the little ones. Our main task and purpose is to plant seeds of faith and to share God's love to the children, including praying habits such as prayer before refreshment, praying for birthday children and those who are sick. Initially, the playgroup was set up for the BPGC's community but through God's grace, our tent has been enlarged to include other areas like Kajang, Seri Kembangan, Putrajaya, Cyberjaya and Kota Kemuning through recommendation by the mothers who have children with us.



We have the privilege of ministering to children of various backgrounds. Thank God the work has begun to attract the participation of more non-believers. Praise the Lord who enables this! And our efforts toward this work has been much appreciated by the mothers who send text messages to us with appreciation when their children leave for kindergarten.

BPGC Playgroup has been going on for 9 years now since we started in October 2014. Our praise and thanksgiving to God our Father for blessings and enabling us thus far.

We have a section with shelves consisting of educational toys, sensory play items, puzzlers, motor skill toys, matching activities, etc. This is the Free Play area where children will spend 45 mins when they first arrive playing with the various items on the shelves under supervision of the mothers. While the children are at the Free Play, teachers and helpers will move around to chat with the mothers and children.

After Free Play comes the Circle Time where children will sit in a semi-circle for a Singing Session for 15 minutes followed by Snack Time for children. When they have finished their snack they will go to the play room to play among themselves. There are a variety of toys in the

Playroom. They will be supervised by teachers and helpers.

While children are in the Playroom, the mothers will have their snack time, and interaction among


